

MISSION INTENTION: "For Works of Education in Mission Countries."

Education was never more common than it is today Schools were never more teachers never so many and yet sin and crime were perhaps nover so "respectable" and so easily concioned. Government and civic bodies are becoming alarmed. "Bring back religion" is their frantic ples, "for education divorced from religion is ending in chaos and destruction

It was the intellectual license that followed in the train of the so-called Reformation that eventually brought about the rupture between science and religion. Our ingrained convictions and habits are largely the result of our education. The Church has always insisted that genuino education must aim not only at developing intelligence and imparting knowledge but also at forming character. Its object is to train one to live both here and hereafter. To attain this goal one must study not only literature, history, art and science but, most morality and religion.

It is because common educa-tion is so often lacking in these fundamentals that the Church today maintains at immense axpense and sacrifice a vast net-work of schools covering the face of the earth. Therein she teaches not only religion but the entire gamut of human science.

If it is imperative that people

in Christian lands be laught to think and act correctly from childhood, it is no less important that the converts of the Church in mission countries to given a right intellectual start also, Hence, her network of schools extends to those countries as

tries of the world a total of 94,-000 achools with 4.260 000 pupils and 76,000 teachers. It is evident that the Church is making a valuent affort to supply her children in mission lands with an adequate mental and moral equipment of mind and heart as far as her limited means permit, and in most lands her efforts are highly respected by the govern-mental authorities. The people, Catholics and pagan alike, are desirous of enrolling their children in our schools. The Rev Bruno Bitter, SJ, of the Jochi University in Tokyo, Japan writes that both schools, the high school and college will be crowded to capacity in September. Applications from 651 students have been received and 300 are taking the college entrance examinations. At least two-thirds are non-Catholic

It is the desire of our Holy Father that our prayers during the month of June be offered for Catholic education in Mission Countries We should pray for abounding grace on the efforts of our missionaries, their teachers and pupils, and for increasing generosity on the part of the faithful so that the educational program of the church on the Missions may find full realiza-

"May I beg you to come to the assistance of this missionary-Blahop, through the members of the Society for the Propagation of the Faith

"His Holiness Pope Plus XII has appointed me Bishop of the poor and large mission diocese of Krishnagar, India. Out of the 7,300,000 inhabitants only 6,700 are Catholic and most of these people belong to the lowest class of the so-called untouchables. There are only 12 priests, 12 lay brothers and 48 Sisters for this immense mission. The reason why we do not have more missionszies is due to the lack of financial help. We could easily increase their number if we only had the means. \$30.00 will sup-port a priest or Sister on the

missions for one month. "However, we not only need more priests and Sisters but also more catechists, who are the main helpers to our missionaries. A contribution of \$5.00 is sufficient to maintain a catchiat for one month. I am sure that you will be able to find many kind friends among the members of your Society who will gladly give this amount to support a catechist. We are now establishing a new center of small Catholic communities and we have to place two or three catechists at


the head of each center. At present we have 48 centers.

"We have built small temporary chapels and schools all of bamboo, but with the first strong wind they are blown down. With a donation of \$500 we would be able to build a chapel of strong material and with \$1,000 a mission school, so that the children of these new centers would not only receive catechism instructions but instructions in general. Don't you think that some Catholic mission-minded family in your diocese would like to erect a chapel or school in memory of their beloved ones?

"Most of my missionaries are European and have received their support from the Old World But as you know at the present time with the terrible war raging across the Atlantic, all their help has been cut off. May I. therefore, appeal to the charity of the members of your Society and assure them that any dona-tion, large or small, will be great-

ly appreciated.
