Devotion to the Sacred Heart
Since the heart has always been considered the center of affection, devotion to the Sacred Heart of Jesus existed from the time of the earliest Christians. The Church prior to the revelations to St. Margaret Mary Alacoque, however, it was the personal love of the Redeemer for each individual of the human race which prompted Him to reveal to the humble religious of Paray-le-Monial His longing for the affection of His children. From that momentous period toward the end of the 17th Century devotion to the Sacred Heart, as we know it today, began to flourish. Although a century passed before it received the full approval of the Church, the observance of a universal fast—honoring the Sacred Heart did not receive worldwide recognition until 1856.

Devotion to the Sacred Heart is widespread in India but it remained for the Rev. A. Crommelin of Tuongso to make the devotion a central thing in the lives of his people. In a recent communication he states:

"I am very thankful to God that my Karen have a great love for the Sacred Heart of Jesus and I have tried to foster this as much as possible. Finally I realized that there was a peculiar custom among them—Whenever they build a new house or repair the old one they make a feast. The idea of Enthronement of the Sacred Heart in the house then struck me as an ideal thing. I expected there would be some difficulty in making them understand the practice but they soon grasped the idea. It seemed to be something they had been wanting for some time. I selected a family which was the most prominent in the village and instructed them in the procedure. Then I called others to witness the function. The family prepared a feast with pork, rice and drinks. Not long afterward the head of another family applied to me for the same privilege. Now at the end of one year twenty houses have had a solemn enthronement of the Sacred Heart and the idea is being taken up by other villages."

A Study in Contrasts

Brendal Byrns reports that the new imperial ward of the Ku Klux Klan receives a yearly salary of \$10,000 which is distributed by membership dues. While the salary may be high, it actually represents only a yearly outlay of 1 cent from each of the 2,000,000 reputed members of the Klan.

By contrast, our Catholic missionaries, offering in many ways from the imperial ward, are lucky if they obtain \$100 a day for themselves and the works they are endeavoring to carry out. Yet if every one of the 22 million Catholics in the United States contributed only 10 cents a year for their support, there would be a fund of \$22,000,000 for them.

Mission Chapel Is Erected In 24 Days

WINNIPEG, Canada.—Last September, the Archbishop of Winnipeg, the Most Rev. Alfred A. Smith, O.M.I., to Ojibwayville, some 180 miles northwest of this city, at the terminus of the railroad connecting Lakes Manitoba and Winnipeg.

Ojibwayville had no church, although for the past 20 years it has sheltered a fine colony of Poles who were visited by a priest at long intervals. With the help of his parishioners Father Smith has constructed a chapel in record time—24 days. Practically all the work was done by the parishioners themselves. The chapel was blessed by the Archbishop.

69 Foot Fall Falls To Injure Worker

ABUNCON, Paraguay.—The recent escape of a worker from death here has impressed this city. The man was working on the Sanctuary of the Virgin of Itaipu when he fell 69 feet from a scaffolding, but suffered only slight injuries.

Exiled Bishop Now Heads Chaplains

KAUNAS, Lithuania.—The Most Rev. T. Matulionis, Russian Bishop who was exiled by Soviet Russian authorities and who is now resident in this country, has been named Ordinary of all the military chaplains of the Republic of Lithuania.

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
