CONVENTION ECHOES

Equal Rights Plank of GOP Demanded

WASHINGTON—(NC) Inclusion of a so-called "equal rights plank" in the 1940 platform of the Republican Party is vigorously demanded by Miss Hesse Schneiderman, President of the National Women's Trade Union League of America, in a statement made public here. "The platform plank in Philadelphia must have been handed to be beguiled by a vociferous minority of women, with no industrial experience, into incorporating in their program the so-called 'equal rights amendment' which the National Woman's Party has been peddling around for the past sixteen years," said Miss Schneiderman. "All of us are for real equality of opportunity," Miss Schneiderman added, "but this amendment, far from advancing the status of women, actually jeopardizes most of the social gains they have made. And it certainly sells the working women of the United States down the river."

According To The Doctor

There were only three deaths from smallpox in three years in Wisconsin, according to the State Medical Society. Smallpox is a highly contagious disease and is one of the most frequently fatal of all acute diseases. It has attacked all ages and all races, prevailed in countries over the entire globe, and occurred throughout all periods of man's existence. Due to Jenner's discovery in 1789, this disease has become so rarely. However, it is not extinct in every part of the world and we read of an outbreak in certain communities. If we become careless in protecting ourselves and our children, it is highly possible that it would flourish again as it did in the eighteenth century. No specific remedy is available for the treatment of smallpox; however, there is a method by which one may be safeguarded against this horrible, disgusting malady. This protection is produced by vaccination. Vaccination of infants is attended with much less discomfort than that of older children. It should be performed before the child reaches one year of age and as soon after birth as practicable, preferably before teething. Vaccination consists in introducing the virus of cowpox into the human skin and the reaction resulting therefrom has, from experience, been found to protect the individual against smallpox. The vaccine of the present day is manufactured by a company's process, and is sold by the Federal Government and such vaccine is required to be tested for purity before it is marketed. Parents and children alike should be vaccinated for smallpox. If everyone took this preventive measure, this disease would be unknown. It exists in this world due to the unvaccinated, who are a detriment not only to themselves but to everyone in the community. 300 NUNS PARTICIPATE IN CITIZENSHIP INSTITUTE

ST. LOUIS.—More than 300 Sisters participated in the Institute of American Citizenship held this week at Fontbonne College. Featuring a daily program of lectures and round table discussions led by Miss Mary Synon, editorial consultant of the Commission on American Citizenship of the Catholic Encyclopedia, Washington, D. C., the Institute was sponsored by the college as a part of its regular summer session. The purpose of the Institute was the training of Sisters for the teaching of better citizenship in parochial schools throughout the country. It was under the general direction of the Sisters of St. Joseph at Conception, Sister Maryella Jennings is Dean of the College. News is still lacking regarding most of the Polish convents of this Congregation, founded by St. John Beata.
