Ground Broken For New Nazareth College

29 Novices Pronounce Vows On Same Day

A new Nazareth College will rise on the grounds west of the Sisters of St. Joseph Motherhouse, Pittsburgh, Pa. The ceremony was held on July 5, when the first spadeful of dirt for the first of four new buildings.

The ground-breaking ceremony followed a reception and a profession when 17 novices pronounced Perpetual Vows, 12 novices made their Temporary Vows and seven postulants received the Holy Habit.

A large assembly of priests, former students of the college, parents of students and alumni with the Sisters of St. Joseph witnessed the ground-breaking for the new college.

The first building to be erected will contain classrooms and a gymnasium. This will be followed by three other buildings. It is scheduled to open the new college in September, 1941.

Students at that time will live in the motherhouse and use the cafeteria and chapel facilities.

Predicts 'Gangster Nation' Will Feel Hand of God

That the "gangster nation" will be summarily dealt with by God as are individuals who sin was the forcible prediction of the Rev. John B. Delaney, C.S.C., dean of the University of Portland in his fourth of July sermon at Sacred Heart Pro-Cathedral.

His eloquent discourse came during the Solemn Pontifical Votive Mass of the Immaculate Conception celebrated by His Excellency, the Most Rev. James E. Kearney, D.D., Bishop of Rochester, for the preservation of the "democratic traditions in these United States that we love." More than 90 persons, including non-Catholics, were present.

Mr. O'Brien died at his home, Friday, July 6, at the age of 78. Solemn Mass of Requiem was offered by Father O'Brien, assisted by the Rev. John P. O'Brien and deacon and the Rev. Alphonse P. Ginnias as subdeacon.

2,000 Polish Falcons At Convention Mass

A four-day athletic carnival in which 1,200 boys and girls participated, banquets, dancing, parades and conferences marked the success of the Falcon Convention in this city.

Sunday last, members of the Falcon club, 2,000 strong, marched in body from their headquarters to St. Stanislaus church to attend a solemn high Mass celebrated by Rev. Severin Stelchalski, national chaplain.

Following this a parade was held from Convention Hall in which bands, athletes, visiting officials and other members of the Falcon club marched in a grand procession to Franklin Field where soccer, football and drills were run off.

A banquet at 8 p. m. in Hotel Seneca ended the day.

A letter from President Roosevelt to Dr. Stanislaus, president of the Polish Falcons of America, following the parade was read.

"Dear Dr. Stanislaus: It gives me great pleasure to extend through your cordial greetings to the Polish Falcons of America, men and women of the Polish blood, made rich contributions to our American life. They have risen to their responsibilities in every emergency and have met patriotically every call to service. I trust that the forthcoming gathering at Rochester will be fruitful of constructive action in promoting the spirit of freedom, national unity to current European events."

Dr. Stanislaus in reply to the President wrote:

"I thank you Mr. President for your beautiful and encouraging letter sent through me to the organization of the Polish Falcons of America and may I in advance assure you we are with you a hundred per cent ready to answer before to obey your call to any duty that this great country of ours will require in these grave and humbling-stocking days."

Chicago Engineers Win Over Noyah Circus Challenge

Little is ever heard from the radio technician. He seems to be a valuable part of the broadcasting industry but one that goes along creating little or no racket about his own importance. The other day a good story came to my desk from the NBC Chicago studios. It told in somewhat humorous fashion of the trials this mid-Westerner engineers had in installing a Calliope in the NBC headquarters. The story was so good in fact that I have included it in this week's column. Here it is...

CHICAGO—Whether you call it a "call-lope" or a "call-lope" if the NBC engineering department at the Chicago studios never has to hook up one of the things again it will be soon enough. That was the conclusion this week as a hired crew announced to their chief that they were unable to hook up the steam calliope for the Show Boat, NBC-Blue Network Friday feature.

The cause of the callope became a pressing problem a few weeks ago when one of the instruments was broken. The location in NBC studios to set an atmosphere and theme song player for the broadcast. The first difficulty encountered was the steam supply. A forty-three-inch pipe had to be run from the boiler room to the calliope. The pipe was to be all right above a sewer steam or in a circular duct but the way the engineers figured, NBC would have itself a job replacing steam-pipe, and the effect would have been to cut the pipe out of the wall.

Obviously the answer was to work with air. Several tanks of compressed air were rushed to the studio and the new steamless callope was given a tentative workout.

After development following the first test of the unattached pipe was discovered that the callope kicked out enough volume to be heard 10 miles away. A portable shanty was hurriedly thrown up around the device, cutting the volume down to a tolerable level. Except for having to hack a hole in the side of the shanty so the callope player could see the program director, the shanty was an improvement.

The next crisis came with discovery that the average compressed air tank would not power the callope for the entire show. About all the player could get per tank was four bars, and then the music expired in a ghastly sigh while somebody hurriedly hooked on another air tank.

In a final effort to tame the monster, engineers tunneled, through concrete walls and ran a high-pressure pipe line from the air conditioning plant to the studio, and attached a motor-driven air compressor designed to feed 150 cubic feet a minute to the callope. It looked as though it might work.

It did—except for the cuts like "pull-pull" the compressor delivered to the studio microphone via the pipe line. The engineers fixed that by installing an automobile muffler in the line. And so the problem of the automobile-bike-muffled, air-compressor driven, pipe-lined, steamless calliope had been solved.

SISTERS IN INDIA

New Third Order Community Founded

Our readers know about Archbishop Ivanovic of Trivandrum, India. Less than ten years ago he became a convert from the Japanese Church. He was followed by his sister, Bishop about 500,000 people, and over 500,000 people.

The Archbishop writes:

"God is certainly very generous with His Grace. Our converts are growing every week. They come to us in large groups. Naturally and they create new problems.

"These huge conversions, of course, made permanent by educating them and teaching them to read. We can't allow to evangelize and the system of paying Catholics is not entirely satisfactory.

"As another proof of His Love for our work, Almighty God has granted a number of your young men to take their lives to serve the Church as teachers and catechists. I welcomed this idea and allowed them to live together for a period of time before being sent to their posts. I admitted them as novices. The Rule is the Rule of the Third Order of St. Francis. When they were sent to their posts, I asked them to write their names in the 'Missionary'.

"These Missions are all native of this region. They will instruct the new converts. In this country, the women remain together. Only the Sisters leave really native lands.

"Please help me to support these young religious. I have accepted only twelve because I must pay all the bills. I am limited. Everybody comes to me. Sometimes I am naturally sick, when I see all I should do."

"Each one of these Missions needs three dollars a month. This will take more than fifty dollars a month for the twelve. Won't you do something?"

We would like to do something. This new and struggling community asks our readers for help. Five Dollars a month for each sister would be a great help. Will you take care of one Sister for a month, or a year?
