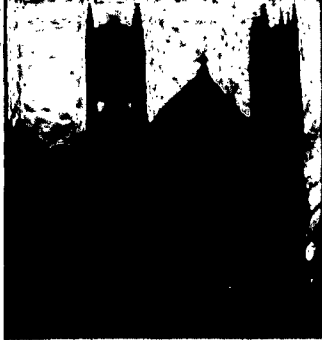

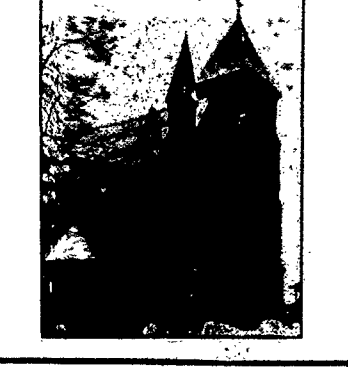

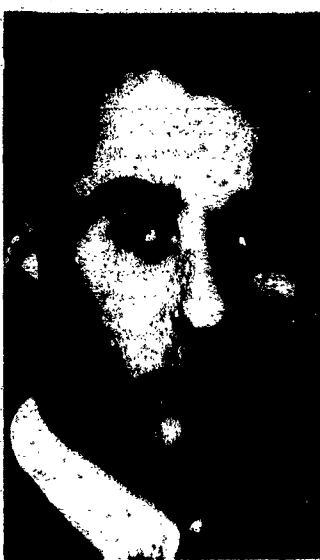

Nazareth Called Model For All Cloister Life

NEW YORK - "Nazareth is the divine pattern upon which the life of the cloister in the Catholic Church is fashioned," said the Rev. Herbert J. Gallagher, O.F.M., Sunday night in his address over the "Catholic Hour."
"The 'Catholic Hour' is broadcast over a network of the National Broadcasting Company through Station WJAF here and is produced by the National Council of Catholic Men."
Referring to the "Hidden Life of Christ" during the 30 years preceding His public ministry, Father Gallagher said "religious life in the cloister is no more empty and idle than the hidden life of Christ in Nazareth. It matters very little what men judge of our lives but it matters very much what God thinks of them."
"Nazareth is also the model upon which the daily lives of Christians in the world must be formed," he said. "Our Divine Lord wished to be like His brethren, to share our lot as He shared our nature. Now the vast majority of men live in obscurity. It was for this reason that Christ wished to have unknown. To the many men and women who lead quite ordinary Christian lives who seem to have no vocation to any special heroism in God's service, yet who walk in His presence and in the way of His Commandments, seeing Christ in their loneliness and toiling, in His creatures and to the saints who have entered the home of Nazareth with the golden key of suffering, whose own hidden life is tabernacled with Christ in God—to all these the hidden life of Christ is an example and an inspiration."
Father Gallagher said our Lord's life had "only three years of action," and yet it was a "full thirty years of silence and labor, of docile obedience to His very creatures and submission to the circumstances directed by His Own Hand." "Full thirty years of detachment from the world, from its opinions, and its passing glories, he declared. "This was Christ's vocation and it is ours. Our life is not one of incessant public display. It is in great measure a hidden life. To permeate it with the spirit of Christ at Nazareth will be to fill it with the peace of Nazareth. Love and serve Christ in the quiet Nazareth of your own heart and you will live in His Sacred Heart. Your own life will then be hidden with Christ in God."

Medical Aid In Patna

We have just received a most interesting letter this morning from Sister Leticia, a member of the community of Catholic Medical Missionaries. Perhaps a good many of you will remember Sister Leticia's visit to Rochester shortly after that, at the invitation of the Jesuit Fathers, she left for Patna, India, to conduct a medical mission center. Her letter following, gives you some idea of the conditions that confront her and her co-workers.
"In December we came to Patna to open a small hospital. We have a little building, some good surgical instruments and five hundred rupees (about \$170,000) and trust in the Lord.
"We are having a great deal of fun spending our money. It has to stretch a long way to whitewashing, electric wiring, painting, drugs, bed covers, straw mats, tables, dispensary furnishings and a thousand other items. We made a list of our minimum requirements and it came to a thousand dollars so it had to be begged, doled out, and most of its sources, rationed.
"You should see Patna! It consists of one long street that never begins and never ends. It runs parallel with the Ganges for miles and miles and miles. There are no roads, no sidewalks and there that wander off from it, but within a few minutes they are lost in the Ganges on one side and in the jungle on the other. It is about as wide as three bulldozer-churns and solid along this street that one could ever think of. Bargaining dogs go on at a great rate and on top notes our meat is kid (aged kid) at times. We go and bargain at great length for a pound of mutton, it small it try elsewhere and finally buy five cents worth. Next we sent sugar, we try at least three or four places until we get the most, the cleanest for our money. Then for nothing. Stop.
