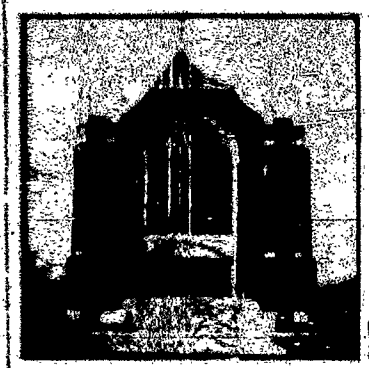

### Faith Stories For Little Ones

TRUE OBEDIENCE  
In one of the principal cities of France there lived a young boy, whose parents so far neglected the practice of their religion as to use fresh meats on all days alike, without regard to the laws of the Church.

When preparing for his first Communion, the boy went to confession, and among other faults accused himself of not keeping the days of abstinence. His confessor explained to him the greatness of the sin of which he had hitherto no idea, and laid down rules for his future conduct which he promised faithfully to observe.

It was not long before his resolution was put to the test, for on the following Friday nothing was served up for dinner but the usual fare. The boy was helped like the rest, but begged to be excused from taking it. His father was much astonished, and demanded the cause of his refusal. He replied that it was an abstinence day, on which it was forbidden by the Church to eat fresh meat, adding that he was quite ready to make his dinner on the bread and vegetables.

His father being very angry took him from the table without allowing him to eat a mouthful, and shut him up in a solitary room, telling him that he should remain there until the next day. The boy made no answer, and submitted to his punishment without a murmur.

In the course of the evening his mother, who, though as negligent as her father, should remain in bed, could not help feeling for the privations of her child, came to see him and brought him some food, at the same time reproving him for his disobedience.

What was her surprise when he refused to take it. "My father," said he, "has condemned me to fast till tomorrow, and as I can obey him in that without sin I obey rather than eat what you have been so good as to bring me."

The mother, much affected, hearing her child express himself with such sense and modesty, went to tell her husband what had passed. The latter was equally struck with the conduct of the child, and going to his room, tenderly embraced him, and asked him who had taught him to be so faithful to his duty.

Learning that it was his confessor, the father went to visit him without delay, thanked him for his care in having his son so obediently confessed, and begged him to hear his own confession. His conversion was sincere, and was soon followed by that of his wife. The noble conduct of the child was thus the happy means of reconciling his parents to God.—Anecdotes Chrétiennes.

### 2 Cures Reported At St. Anne's Shrine

HALIFAX, N. S. — Two cures are reported in a Halifax pilgrimage to the St. Anne de Beaupre Shrine at Quebec by the Halifax Herald, local daily secular newspaper here.

"Two cures were reported to have rewarded the prayers and efforts of those who made the pilgrimage to St. Anne de Beaupre," the paper states.

"The first cure was reported when eight-year-old Eileen Julian of Grand Desert who suffered from a tubercular hip expressed a desire to walk. The child had worn a cast for three years, used a wheel chair and had never walked. The doctors would not operate because she was too weak to undergo the operation.

Miss Hilda Goudreau lifted the child from the wheel chair, and with the aid of her hands and the mother's little girl very slowly walked a short distance to the miraculous statue of St. Anne Our (Thursday two days later) after Solemn Benediction and the special blessing for the sick, Eileen walked up the center aisle of the church while the congregation immediately fell on their knees in thanksgiving.

"The second was Mrs. Margaret Gillis Sponhill, who was totally deaf and had not heard a word of the sermons, hymns or prayers during any of the exercises at the shrine. On the train coming home as is the custom on the pilgrimages, the restoration of the hearing was started. Mrs. Gillis was noticed rubbing her ear, and said she felt a queer sensation in it. Suddenly she cried aloud that she could hear the 'Hail Mary,' and in a few minutes she was shouting, 'I can hear the others in the pews, she had not heard before.'

### Did Bellarmine Whisper To Jefferson?

(This article, published originally by The Catholic Information Society of North Carolina, in April, 1937, is re-issued here because of its past popularity and continued timeliness.)

Nearly two centuries apart they lived—Robert Bellarmine, a Catholic theologian and Thomas Jefferson, an American patriot. In their pens inked out philosophies so similarly sound and Godlike, that we wonder, we Catholics, whether at least a whisper from the great theologian did not reach the ear of the great statesman as he pondered and wrote his historic document.

Read the extracts below and see what you think

Declaration of Independence 1776

Cardinal Robert Bellarmine 1576

"All men are created equal; they are endowed by their Creator with certain inalienable rights."

"It is impossible for us to live together without coming to care for the common good, which must be governed by someone in whose will is the nature of man."

"It is impossible for us to live together without coming to care for the common good, which must be governed by someone in whose will is the nature of man."

"It depends upon the consent of the multitude that the government be a King, consul or other magistrate. This power is indeed from God, but it is exercised in these things by the consent and election of men."

"For legitimate reason these people can elect a king, a consul or a magistrate, or a democracy or a republic. The people may transfer its power to a king or magistrate, but it reserves to itself the right of restoring back this power."

"Government by consent of the governed" has been Catholic teaching down through the ages. The 16th Century doctrine of the "Divine Right of Kings" was, and is, as repellent to the Catholic as it is to the American, and when one is both Catholic and American, it is just twice as repellent. So here's to Cardinal Bellarmine and St. Thomas Aquinas! May their philosophies ever govern our lands, and may they conquer these poor lands where "kings still can do no wrong" and where no man dare say them "nay!"

### GIVES OSTENSORIUM COPIED FROM MICHAELANGELO

PHILADELPHIA.—(NC)—An ostensorium, designed by the Michelangelo's painting "Dispute," was presented to the Laymen's Retreat League at Malvern by retreatants from Collingswood, N. J., last Friday night.

The ostensorium, which was made from gold, platinum and silver trinkets donated by the captains of the Collingswood group, which numbers nearly 100 men, is 20 inches high and weighs six pounds. It is made of solid silver and plated with platinum. The top is lined with 14-karat gold. It also contains 60 icons.

George Bierchenok, of Collingswood, manufacturing jeweler who made the sacred vessel, said it was designed from Michelangelo's painting at the suggestion of the Most Rev. Joseph M. Corrigan, Rector of the Catholic University of America, who formerly was Retreat Master at St. Joseph's-in-the-Hills, Hazelton. He said it is the only one of its kind in the United States.
