#### For the Altar

Everything around the Altar must be clean and dignified. Everything used at Holy Mass should be spotless. Our missionaries need linen for Altar Cloths. Enough linen can be purchased in the Near East for five dollars to take care of an Altar. The Sisters will do the cutting and sewing.

#### A SACRED SPOT

Mount Olivet is one of the most sacred places in the world. To Christians it is sacred because Our Divine Lord often went there. From Mount Olivet He prophesied the destruction of the Temple, the ruin of Jerusalem. Near it is the Garden of Gethsemane and from it He ascended to Heaven.

Father Ardan, the director of the Syrian Seminary at Mt. Olivet, writes to us: "Our Seminary is situated on Holy ground. Our students walk the same roads as Our Divine Lord travelled. Every day they tread the spots that will forever be sacred."

"This year we have thirty students. Five will be ready for ordination next Easter. All are praying for the Grace to be worthy and zealous priests."

"I must tell you there is a strong possibility that we must close the seminary. We are at the end of our resources. For many years the Catholics of France helped us. Today they can send us nothing. In other years visitors to the Holy Land called here and generously gave us something. Today there are no visitors."

"Every source of revenue has been cut. We go only from day to day. I ask for food for these students. One day they will be priests working with their own people, provided we can keep the seminary open."

"It is expensive to live here. It costs ten dollars a month for each member of the community. I ask for your help. Our students will not forget those who aid us."

Surely our readers will answer the plea of Father Ardan. No Catholic would wish to see the seminary on Mount Olivet closed. Ten dollars will support a student for a month. Will you take care of me?"

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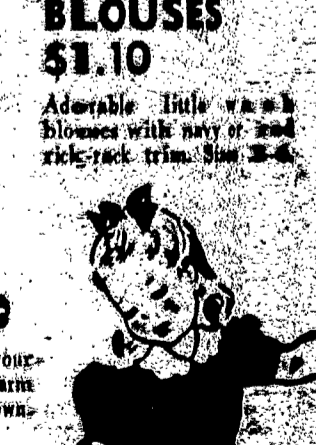


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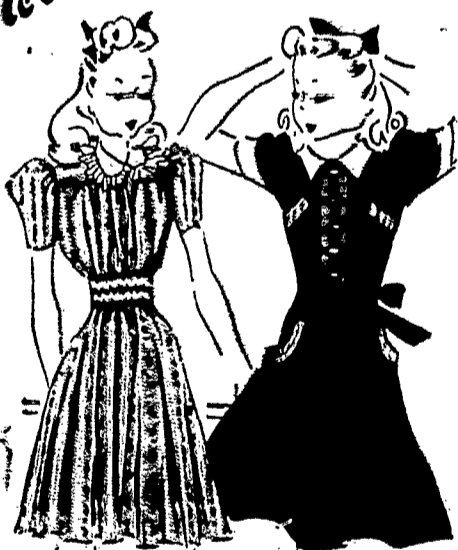
