comes strong-arm man for the machine then alderman, mayor and finally governor. When he attempts to do one honest thing, his misdeeds catch up with him.

Brian Donlevy, long an excellent supporting actor, has his first leading role of any consequence as McGinty and is vigorous and able, taking advantage of every opportunity for comedy and characterization.

Mariel Argenta is his sympathetic wife and Akim Tamiroff, Louis Jean Heydt, Steffi Duna and William Demarest lend the support it's fast and punchy satire—not a great picture at all, but a very entertaining one.

Other Films

The plot of "Slightly Tempted" (Not classified) is in the old "Alias the Deceivers" mold that has been used over and over again. However, Hugh Herbert has several moments of comedy that boosts the average of the picture.

"Argentine Nights" (A-1) is a wondrously romantic that contains a couple of good Andrews Sisters specialties and a couple of Rita Brothers specialties that may be good, depending on how you feel about the Rita Brothers. Attractive Constantine Moore and handsome George Reeves are also present.

Incidentally we neglected to pay tribute to two of the silliest scenes of the year in last week's column. One of these was from the Shirley Temple picture, "Young People" (A-1). Jack Oakie and Charlotte Greenwood, played the vaudeville team, who have adopted Shirley as an infant, have at last decided to tell the moppet that she is not their own daughter. For some reason, this scene takes place in an automobile during a cloud-burst that is rapidly turning into a hurricane. Dramatically they deliver their news, then tensely wait to see how Shirley takes it. But you know little Madame T. Always a trouper, she flashes her sunniest smile and immediately launches into the theme song, "I Wouldn't Give a Million for a Mom and Dad Like You." Anything for a song!

The other scene was from that awful little opus, "Girls of the Road" (A-2). After establishing the girls as feminine Dead End Kids—only twice as tough—the picture decided it was time for a big set scene. So one of the minor characters is killed off and the girl buries her on the side of the hill. And they all go and gather field flowers, carrying them reverently in their arms to the grave. SCHOOL IN HOLY LAND

On the Eastern side of the Jordan is the region of the Holy Land called Transjordan. One of the many villages is Nazareth. Monks of the Apostolic Delegation writes:

"In the Holy Land we have many private Catholic schools, but no public school. The greatest need is to provide schools. Here in Our Lord's own country Catholics are few and very poor. The Jews and Mohammedans predominate. I am writing about the little village of Nazareth. It is a mission school, a chapel which also serves as a school. To call it a school is really not accurate. One room, no light except what comes from one window. No desks except the straight-pews used at Mass."

"We can't continue this way, yet, if we close the school our children will go to the Mohammedan school. If they do, they will lose their faith."

"We must build a school. It will be small but it will be a school. We must have two classrooms. This must be furnished."

"Ten Dollars for Dollars will build the school and one hundred twenty-five dollars will furnish it. This money will mean the difference between a village taking care of its children, or one where the children are without Catholic training. Please remember us."

Who will answer the Archbishop's appeal? It deserves an answer. Imagine building a school for Four Hundred Dollars. The present and future generations will feel the effect of this school. Perhaps somebody can send one hundred twenty-five dollars and pay for all the furnishings. We ask our readers to send something, we will mail it."
