Pope Extolls Jesuit Order

Cites 4 Centuries Of Noble Deeds

VATICAN CITY, (NO.)—Words of highest praise for the glorious achievements of the Society of Jesus are contained in the Apostolic Letter which His Holiness Pope Pius XII, addressed to the Very Rev. Vladimir Ladochowski, Superior General of the Society, in commemorating the four hundredth anniversary of the Society's birth. "Certainly," the Holy Father wrote, "you know how we esteem the family of St. Ignatius, which you have been governing with care and prudence for 20 years. It will suggest you, therefore, if on this occasion of the fourth century since our predecessor of immortal memory, Paul III, with his Apostolic Letter, Regimini Militantis Ecclesiae, founded the Society of Jesus, you desire to take part in your joy and in your century celebration. It is true that this moment of general concern and anxiety seems to throw a veil of gloom on this happy remembrance. But this does not prevent it being a cause of joy for all these Churches. Notable Achievements. Of your Society's notable enterprises, we wish to recall some to memory at least summarily and briefly, not only for our and your comfort, but also in order that all persons may render fervent thanks to God for his achievements and see in it a good omen for future progress. Doubtless difficult were the times in which your Legislator and Father was introduced into the world. On one part an ardent passion for the thought and culture of the ancient pagan influence of the spiritus saeculi that often Christian Doctrine was declined, or was distorted and corrupted. Thus many persons, sometimes even those who should have been of example to others, had fallen into relaxation of customs and even into open disorder and moral perversion. But in those terrible moments a marvelous phenomenon took place. Jesus Christ, Himself, seemed to come to the salvage of His Church. As if in a new springtime there arose in the Church's garden marvelous flowers of sanctity. Men and women, marvels of Christian virtue, arose as barriers against the overflowing tide of impiety. Now everyone knows that in the number of these Saints, Ignatius of Loyola has a glorious place. Like other Saints, Ignatius was a man of peace. He called upon St. Ignatius and his Society to face the errors of that time. In the course of these four centuries, the followers of your Legislator and Father have fought with unconquerable spirit against the rising of new errors. Defense of Faith. We know that your Society since its origin has always dedicated itself with all its forces to the defense of the integrity of the Catholic Faith against all sophisms and errors, to the vindication of the rights of the Church and to the propagation of the Christian religion in all the world. In all its fields of activity, wherever should places, even hurriedly through your annual would find an abundance of events worthy of being written in letters of gold in the records of the Church. It is here that come to our mind the names of such glorious Saints as Peter Canisius and Robert Bellarmine, whom our immediate predecessor proclaimed Doctors of the Church and who, with wisdom of words and writings, confused deniers of Catholic Doctrine, the names of Peter Claver, John Francis Regis and Francesco de Gerolamo, who, with enlightened zeal and untiring work, either brought men to the faith, or brought back to Christ or to a life more conforming to Catholic Faith. Lastly, names such as Francis Borgia and Giuseppe Sighele. "Nor did the great heart of Ignatius fail to turn to distant peoples, as did that of that glorious son of Ignatius, Francesco Saverio, whom our predecessor proclaimed Apostle of the Indies and patron of the missions, and whom so many of your Society have followed and still follow, giving themselves everywhere to the apostolic work of the missions. "Now we rejoice of martyrs lacking in your Society, many of the members of which after having spread and defended the Catholic Faith in almost all regions of the world also shed their blood for their religion. Educational Endeavors. "If the members of the Divine Redeemer have prosecuted your religious Society with particular hostility, it is in your praise. Our Saviour had predicted this persecution to His Apostles. "You, and those of your Society, have ever known too that the fate of Church and State depends upon the teaching in the schools. We offer praise, therefore, for the number of institutions you have established for the study of letters and sciences with praiseworthy thought for youth, you offer such examples as the Holy Saints Louis Gonzaga, St. Berchmans and Stanislaus Kostka." JESUITS CENTENARY MEXICAN PROMISES

Gamacho Vows New Mexico

Aids Catholicism Bars Communism

MEXICO CITY.—A remarkable and wholly unexpected authorized statement by Gen. Manuel Avila Camacho, who has been declared by the Mexican Congress as the next President of Mexico, succeeding Lazaro Cardenas, has stirred intense discussion throughout political circles in the country. Four striking assertions in General Camacho's statement are: First, that his chief nation policy will be to aid Catholicism, by origin and moral sentiment. Second, that Communism will not take part in his government. Third, that he is not a Socialist, but a believer in democracy, liberty and economic well-being. Fourth, that Lombarado Toledano, powerful Mexican labor leader often accused of being a Communist, will not be a "collaborator" in the Camacho Government. Expected. On all these counts, General Camacho's statement is extraordinary. In the presidential election his principles were an important opponent of General Camacho who stressed as one of the planks in his platform that under him justice would be done the Catholic Church. Furthermore, Camacho a candidate of the Mexican Revolutionary Party, was supported by President Cardenas, who had vigorously pushed laws unfavorable to the Catholic Church. It is also to be recalled that the change was frequently made against Cardenas that he included Communism in his government and that such radical steps as the promotion of Socialist teaching in the school curriculum were taken in his regime. The text of President-elect Camacho's statement is as follows: "I am a believer, and a Catholic, by birth and moral sentiment, I will not conduct my government by a coteries of friends, and I am sure Lombarado Toledano will not be a collaborator in my government. I should desire the collaboration of General Cardenas. Communists will not take part in my government, and, in fact, because their principles are in conflict with the national sentiment of Mexico, they will never be permitted to intrude themselves in Mexico, which is a country of true liberals. The people deeply love the country, preparing their own economic and political life, only a democratic regime can prosper. I believe our national economy ought to provide an improvement in the condition of the working classes, but I am not a Socialist. I believe in democracy, in liberty, and in economic well-being. Plan Modifications. "The Civil Service Law will be modified and augmented in accordance with the experience and knowledge gained from the past. Obligatory military training will be established for the benefit of the country, because it will provide for the nation's security and discipline for our youth. "Mexico is peaceful and thus there is no need to subvert the present order. It will be my constant conviction that it is wrong to think only of the welfare of the few, since every individual Mexican is important. "I will encourage both Mexican and foreign investments. "In this interest before I occupy the Presidency, I will seek out men of moral integrity, who will be the guarantee of the successful development of a program aimed at the country's welfare. Article 130 of the Constitution (Education) will not be modified, but with fanaticism, not with Catholicism. I will endeavor to further the spiritual culture of the Mexican people and I desire that the University, through its educational facilities, aid in the promotion of the State's program without, however, sacrificing its autonomy. "It is my hope and desire that relations with Spain can be renewed at an early date. African Missions in U. S. Publish Pamphlet. SILVER SPRING, Md.—The Society of African Missions in America has published its first number of a new publication, The African Frontiers. The eight-page issue includes data on the Society in general and its new American foundation here in particular. The Society, which is devoted to the evangelization of the Negro in Africa and elsewhere, was founded in 1859 by Bishop Marlon de Dreuilac and today has five provinces—two in France, one in Ireland, one in Holland, the youngest in America. New School Head. Manchester, N. H.—Appointment of the Rev. William J. Collins as head of the Diocese Department of Education has been made through the Chancery Office here.

Catholic U. Doubles Enrollment As War Restricts Studies

WASHINGTON.—Increased enrollment the past few years has made it necessary to double the capacity of the priest-students' dining room at the Catholic University of America here. Work on the addition to the dining hall has commenced. With the beginning of the current school year, the university's rolls have been swelled by a large number of priests who have been obliged to remain in America for advanced studies because of unsettled conditions abroad.
