"I Am Responsible"
Upon the frail shoulders of
woman, particularly when they
work in the mission field, there are
often placed responsibilities which
would terrify the strongest man.
It is not surprising then to learn
that Sister Mary Agnes, Mariat
Scrupler of the Export Hospital
at Makona, in the far West
Islands, decided to build an addi-
tion to the chapel for her 600
patients. It is not surprising, either,
that this undertaking presented
many difficulties not the least of
which was the disheartening
word of the contractor that the
original building was in such
poor repair that it was impos-
sible to make any additions; a
completely new building would
have to be constructed.
"I alone am responsible for the
completion of this chapel," states
Sister Mary Agnes in a letter
recently received, "and, as I have
to attend the General Chap-
laincy of our community in Janu-
ary, my Sisters are urging me to
leave the work finished before my
departure. They did not mention
that, after 45 years in the tropics
with a chronic bronchitis, I may
not return, nor did they furnish
me with any hope as to where I
shall find the means necessary to
complete the project."
Let us hope Sister Mary Agnes'
responsibility will find an echo in
the hearts of some generous
Catholics who will make possible
the fulfillment of a plan dreamed
of for nearly fifty years.
