La Guardia Owns Magistrate In Anti-Filth Drive

NEW YORK.—(N. C.)—The president of one of the country's largest magazine distributing agencies is being held here in \$5,000 bail on a charge of distributing an indecent publication.

The warrant for Julius Stolz, President of the Interborough News Company, was sworn out by Mayor Fiorello La Guardia in connection with his drive against indecent periodicals in this city and the defendant held by the Mayor himself acting as a committing magistrate.

The Mayor himself acted as a magistrate in a suit brought by the New York State Department of the American Legion demanding his removal because of his connections with an organization advocating the overthrow of the government.

The appointment of Mr. Gerzon has been the object of constant attack on the part of Catholics as well as other fraternal and patriotic organizations in an editorial captioned "An Overtone of Ruse."

Defense counsel said Mr. Stolz had been one of the distributors who offered to co-operate with the Mayor in his drive against printed filth.

Earlier in the day Mayor La Guardia kept a promise he had made to order the Department of Sanitation to go after published filth.

275 Chaplains Needed for Army Posts By April 1

Priests To Be Assigned To Active Duty; Morale Division Mapped

WASHINGTON—(N. C.)—With the setting up by the War Department of a Morale Division as its operating agency for matters pertaining to the recreational and welfare activities of the great peace-time army in the history of the United States, it became known today that the Army is seeking 275 additional Catholic Chaplains for active duty by Apr. 1.

At the office of Army Chief of Chaplains William R. Arnold, it was stated that the Army has need of 1,000 new Chaplains. On the basis of the Catholic Church, it was stated that 275 more priests will be needed for army service. One Chaplain is added to the Chaplains Corps for every additional 1,500 officers and men brought into active service, a Chaplain being assigned to every regiment, or equivalent army unit, and to hospitals and the various army headquarters.

In its call for additional Chaplains, Chief of Chaplains Arnold said, the army is receiving the cooperation of the Most Rev. John P. O'Hara, C.S.C., Military Delegate. Many of the priests recently assigned to Chaplain duty, he said, are members of Religious Orders.

Reserve Corps Increase—Authorization also has been received to increase the Chaplain Reserve Corps from 1,440 to 1,700. At present the spiritual needs of the Army are being cared for by 295 Chaplains of the Regular Army and 126 Reserve Chaplains who have been called to active duty. While the regular limit for Chaplains in the Regular Army is 40 years, that of the Reserve Corps is 45 years.

In connection with the setting up of the Morale Division, the Adjutant General, Major-General Murray A. Adams, has been designated Morale Chief of the Army. At the office of the Adjutant General it was stated today that while the collaboration of civilian organizations will be welcomed, the Army itself will control all morale activities within the army, in camps and in the field.

It was stated that such civilian organizations as set up quarters outside the posts and camps will be encouraged. In the period of American participation in the World War, the National Catholic War Council, the Knights of Columbus, the Young Men's Christian Association, the Salvation Army, the Jewish Welfare Board and other fraternal and patriotic organizations within the great encampments in this country and in A.E.F. centers abroad.

Mobilization regulations of the War Department provide that "At the proper time the Secretary of War will invite the several divisions of organizations to send representatives to constitute, together with representatives of the War Department, an agency to be designated as the War Department Advisory Welfare Council." This council will be the national civilian welfare agency in connection with the activities of the national civilian welfare organizations.

The mobilization regulations further state that: "At the proper time, corps area and department commanders will be authorized to organize corps area or department advisory welfare councils in the same manner and for the same purpose as indicated above for the War Department Advisory Welfare Council."

At the office of the Adjutant General it was stated that designation of such national, corps area and department advisory councils will not be undertaken in the present peace-time mobilization. Matters pertaining to the religious needs of the army, it was stated, will continue to be under the direction supervision of the office of the Chief of Chaplains.

Discusses Charities Trends

Joseph M. Whelan, chairman of the National Council of Catholic Charities, discussed the trends of Catholic charities at a meeting of the National Council of Catholic Charities held Monday afternoon at the Family and Children's Division of Catholic Charities at 30 State Street.

The speaker currently studying the work of Catholic agencies and institutions in the United States discussed the changing pattern that characterizes the present programs in Catholic agencies and institutions.

Said he in part: "Catholic Charities has been a sort of witness to the life of the Church. As an auxiliary to the ordinary branches of the Church, it has had to be as sensitive enough to display its various fields to meet the changing demands of different periods."

"Through the depression years when the relief load was almost entirely absorbed by government, Catholic agencies have stressed the service and spiritual role. It is this service and spiritual role that we must emphasize in the future."
