Bishop McQuaid Aided LCBA, Golden Jubilee Recalls

Throughout the country the Ladies' Catholic Benevolent Association is celebrating its Golden Jubilee this year. Many cities have observed the anniversary and during the remaining months of the year other cities will have celebrations. There is particular significance in the coming observance here in Rochester on Tuesday, Oct. 23, when His Excellency, the Most Rev. James E. Keane, Bishop of Rochester, will celebrate a Solemn Pontifical Mass in the Pro-Cathedral of the Sacred Heart and a dinner is planned in the evening. (Detailed announcements will be made next week.) Rochester will have an important place in the celebration of the Golden Jubilee. Bishop McQuaid and other women took an active interest in the Association in its formative days. The first Branch here was No. 27 and it was organized on Aug. 21, 1890, four months after the society was founded in Philadelphia, Pa.
