Bishop Hurley Elevated In Impressive Rite

ROME.—(AP)—Three Cardinals, eight Archbishops, numerous prelates, members of the diplomatic corps and representatives of various ecclesiastical and missionary congregations were present Sunday at the solemn consecration of the Most Rev. Joseph P. Hurley as Bishop of St. Augustine, Florida. The ceremonies, lasting two and a half hours, took place in the chapel of Propaganda College on Janiculum Hill facing the Vatican. His Eminence Luigi Cardinal Maglione, Papal Secretary of State, was the consecrator. Archbishop Carlo Costantini, Secretary of the Sacred Congregation for the Propagation of the Faith, and Archbishop of the Roman Diocese, Cardinal Giuseppe Pizzardi, were his co-consecrators. His Eminence Pietro Cardinal Fumasoni-Biondi, Prefect of the Sacred Congregation for the Propagation of the Faith, His Eminence Giuseppe Cardinal Pizzardi, Prefect of the Sacred Congregation of Seminaries and Universities, were present. The Most Rev. Edward J. Hanna, retired Archbishop of San Francisco, was among the nobles present. Monday morning His Holiness Pope Pius XII received Bishop Hurley in a 20-minute audience. The Holy Father presented the newly consecrated Bishop with a golden crozier adorned with topaz and diamond. Bishop Hurley is a native of St. Louis, Mo.

CONCERT PITCH St. Alphonsus, Founder And Spiritual Writer

(Editor's note: The Redeemptorist Fathers are commemorating the centenary of the canonization of their founder St. Alphonsus in a series of three articles the salient characteristics of their distinguished founder.) Though Saint Alphonsus Liguori is best known among scholars for his epoch-making "Moral Theology," close students of his life are aware that this truly renowned work, important as it is, was only one part of a greater plan. The saint's life had a unity of purpose and design that made his ninety-one years on earth a harmonized whole. The central aim of Alphonsus was to organize a group of priests and lay brothers into a well-knit band of religious workers who would strive incessantly to attain a high form of holiness and who would go out into the world to preach and to save souls. The workers he organized were united into a religious congregation called the Congregation of the Most Holy Redeemer, popularly known in our country as the Redemptorists. It was in the formation and direction of this Congregation that the saint lavished his greatest care. Starting with a few humble companions at Scala in Italy on November 17, 1763, Alphonsus soon saw the happy banding of the members of the congregation almost all of his first companions quickly enlisting new converts into his apostolic band. The intrepid founder never ceased to make that group of men his first and principal concern in life. Visiting Spirit. Vocations came slowly, but they were of high caliber. Among them were Saint Gerard Majella, the Venerable Paul Cafaro, the angelic student, Domenico Bissacot, and others who scaled the heights of sanctity. The congregation attained only a modest growth during the saint's lifetime, but Alphonsus poured into it a hundred ineffable ways of his own vivifying spirit. During all his years, Alphonsus strove to keep his flock alive under the cramped restrictions which such religious societies suffered in his age. State supremacy was much in vogue and the ideas of the "Enlightenment" were rampant. The religious congregations were little more than an appendage to the all-important ruler of the State. After giving ample evidence of a fruitful apostolate among the poor, to whom spiritual exercises, called missions, were preached, the approval of the highest ecclesiastical authorities was won for the Congregation in 1769. The complete approval of the State, however, was much more difficult to obtain. For long years Alphonsus suffered and wrestled as he sought to secure an enterprise he considered to be of the utmost importance to the State. The Redeemptorists were transported across the Alps by the famed Apostle of Vienna, St. Clement Hofbauer, during the closing years of Saint Alphonsus' life but the way was long and painful towards new foundations. So hampered was the Austrian Redeemptorist by the straggling hand of Josephism, the convulsions of the French Revolution and by the long Napoleonic upheavals, he could scarcely gain a foothold. But after St. Clement's death in 1820, the Congregation won the approval of the Austrian government, after which it spread out in rapid fashion to Belgium, Holland, France and other lands. When in the year 1825 saw the election of Most Rev. Nicholas Mauron as Rector Major or Superior General of Saint Alphonsus Congregation, there were only five hundred on its rolls. The following years, however, saw a much deeper growth until today the Redeemptorist number 1,000 members in their Institute, with houses on all continents all over the world.
