The International Federation of Catholic Alumnae held its fourteenth annual convention on Oct. 18 to Oct. 22. Two sisters from Nazareth College attended the sessions.

The Most Reverend Peter Erskine, Bishop of Erie, celebrated Pontifical High Mass in the beautiful cathedral in that city. The Most Reverend Gerald O'Hara, Bishop of Savannah, Georgia, delivered an inspiring and eloquent sermon.

Mrs. George Bradford, President of Nazareth College, presided over the sessions. Every meeting was important and replete with inspiration.

The emceed speakers included the Most Reverend Joseph Corrigan, B.D., Rector of Catholic University, and Most Reverend Patrick J. McCormick, Ph.D., Vice-rector of Catholic University.

Other speakers included the Most Reverend George Johnson, Ph.D., Catholic University, Bishop of Erie, and the Most Reverend Joseph Corrigan, B.D., Rector of Catholic University.

Reports were made by the chairman of the four standing departments. In the Department of Education, four thousand dollar scholarships have been founded.
