original twelve had now grown into hundreds.

They followed nuns striding odyssey from the cradle to the grave, always ready to tend a helpless soul in times of stress and affliction.

First Motherhouse

The growth of the order was almost as rapid as the demands for its multiple services. The first school program which eventually increased the scope of their work in other fields.

They sheltered homeless boys and girls in Rochester's St. Mary's and St. Patrick's Homes. In Elizabethtown they cared for the sick at St. Joseph's Hospital while they also answered a call to staff St. Ann's Home for the Aged in Rochester.

Soon a magnificent new Nazareth Academy sprung up on Lake Avenue in Rochester. Through its doors stepped not only girls from the local Non-Catholic west.

A new Mother House and Novitiate was established on August Street in Rochester. Members of the order were sent to colleges and universities throughout the country and some even traveled to Europe to tap the fountains of the world's greatest sources of knowledge for transmission to the boys and girls of the diocese.

Two and sometimes three generations of a single family were taught by the same Sister of St. Joseph. From schools started by the order sprang a steady procession of young adults to places in the world of today.

Private nurses, doctors, lawyers, teachers, housewives and representatives of many trades and professions often point to some humble Sister of St. Joseph as the guiding light who helped clear away the confusion of youth and chart the course of their lives.

Valve invaluable

The value of a teaching nun to the community in which her influence is felt is incalculable. It cannot be measured in mere terms of dollars and cents. It must be reckoned in terms of character, citizen value and the salvation of a soul.

Upwards of 24,000 boys and girls annually attend the parochial schools in the Rochester Diocese.

Of this number, 13,623 are taught in nearly 50 full-time schools staffed by the Sisters of St. Joseph.

Two years ago the average per pupil cost in New York State public schools was \$31. On this basis, total service rendered by the Sisters of St. Joseph to our schools would be over \$1,058,415.




