Ask Safeguard For Youths In Training Camps

WASHINGTON—A policy for safeguarding Catholic youths in national defense camps was called for here at the Archbishops and Bishops of the United States assembled for their annual meeting.

Outlining a few of the more important problems which have engaged the resources of the National Catholic Welfare Conference during the last year, the Most Rev. Samuel A. Stritch, Archbishop of Chicago and Chairman of the N. C. W. C. Administrative Board, reported at the meeting Monday that the achievements of the Conference have been warmly praised at the Vatican.

War conditions in Europe and national defense measures at home, the N. C. W. C. reports, have called for the most concerted and efficient work on the part of the year work especially by the National Catholic Welfare Conference.

Archbishop Stritch read a letter from His Eminence Luigi Cardinal Maglione, Papal Secretary of State, conveying His Holiness Pope Pius XII's "admiration for the initiative and for the arduous labor with which the Bishops of the United States have given themselves to the task of realizing the directions and counsels of the Holy See in matters of general concern."

LONDON—Before the Adorers of the Sacred Heart left Tyburn Convent, near the Marble Arch, where they had observed perpetual adoration before the Blessed Sacrament for 27 years, the most popular "spotter" system, now popular in industry.

Revolt Will End Nazism

CHICAGO—Dr. George E. F. Dreyer, Professor of Chemistry at Rosary College River Forest, Ill. and a former member of Chancellor Kurt von Schuschnigg's Catholic Democratic Party in Vienna, in an interview with a New World representative here this week said he saw only revolution ahead for Nazi Germany.

"Should Germany succeed in subjugating England and the continent of Europe," he declared, "the concerted efforts of the conquered nations against the economic conditions imposed on them by Germany.

"Should Hitler be defeated," said Dr. Dreyer, "the people will revolt against the conditions they have created."

Indian Girl Enters Notre Dame Order

MONTREAL—Miss Martine Stark, a postulant at the Motherhouse of the Congregation of Notre Dame, there is the first girl of Indian lineage from Prince Edward Island to enter a religious novitiate. She obtained a license at Prince of Wales College, Charlottetown, this year.

33,000,000 ALLOTTED TO OFFSET PROPAGANDA

WASHINGTON—An allotment of \$33,000,000 from the President's special defense fund is to be utilized for cultural work in Latin America to offset propaganda of the German and Italian press.

The great radio and motion picture, it was announced, will be utilized in a movement to create a better understanding between the United States and Latin America. The movement will be under the direction of William A. Rockwell, one of the President's administrative assistants.

Anglicans Withdraw Missioners from Japan

TORONTO—Twenty-six missionaries of the Church of England from Canada will be withdrawn from Japan next April and all properties transferred to the Diocese of Mid-Japan which is headed by Bishop Sasaki.

Four Nuns Killed As Nazis Bomb Convent

LONDON—Four nuns, it is known, were killed when a Nazi bomb completely demolished the convent in the London area. The nuns undertook the mending of the floor in their own convent and it was not known for some time how many nuns were in the convent when it was hit.

Nine persons including a priest were killed when a boys' hostel in the London area was destroyed by a bomb. The superintendent had his wife, their two children and six fish mald were killed together with three boys living in the hostel.

Bible Society Formed By Canadian Catholics

MONTREAL—A Catholic Society of the Bible has been organized here for the purpose of supplying every Catholic with a Bible. The Archbishops of Quebec, Montreal and Ottawa have approved the society, which seeks to offset the propaganda emanating from Communist and Nazi sources by the diffusion of Christian scriptures. The Bible will be published in English, French and other languages, under special committees of duly selected experts in the Holy Scriptures.

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
