W. held in Detroit October 26-30 is given in the November Bulletin of the Catholic Women's Club by Mrs. Robert Hartman, President of the Club and its delegate to the Convention.

Driscoll from the I.T.A. of Sacred Heart parish.

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Getting On In The World. Men often give themselves over to weakness and say they just can't help it. They deny they have the moral strength to be otherwise. But it is true, this fatal defeatism is the natural will unable to resist the temptations and allurements to acquiescence and pride that are felt and seen within and about us. Are the purely human motives of self-respect of regard for the esteem and favor of men, of self-interest and good health, able to keep man on the straight and narrow?

No, the human will was so wounded in the fall of Adam and Eve that the passions outgrow it in strength and authority, unless divine grace be called in to check them and maintain them in subjection. We are perfectly free in every individual temptation for God does not allow temptations above our strength, but without supernatural light and strength the will seldom sees any adequate motive to determine it to exercise its best powers of resistance, and thus the passions usually gain the upper hand.

There are some temptations, indeed which we never experience and education or refinement or natural fear or shame may counteract them. There are also certain times in life when our conduct seems to become dormant and lose any power to injure. But making due allowance for these exceptions the necessity of divine help in the ordinary course of affairs cannot be denied.

This help is actual grace, given us by divine mercy through prayer and the sacraments. Further it gives to actions performed under its influence a supernatural merit, and maintains the soul in supernatural life without which it becomes despicable and dead.

Well Done. Looking back can you remember a well-built fence around an order one piece of well done work? A good repair job on a motor car, a perfectly presented contract report, a medical fee well earned by prompt and skillful attention, a lawsuit saved by a cleverly worded clause? A simple thing well done may be worth living for. Most things well done are done with exasperation.
