WASHINGTON—(N. C.)—Coordination of Catholic interests and activities stemming from the nation's program for preparedness, and the unification of all Catholic relief and refugee work under a single Episcopal Committee were arranged for by the Archbishops and Bishops of the United States at their annual General Meeting, here.

St. Mary's Plans New Hospital

To fill a need felt for many years, a complete new hospital will be erected adjoining the present St. Mary's Hospital, an Nurses Home and will be connected with those buildings to provide greater facilities in meeting the hospital's requirements.

With part of the present hospital, facing Main St. West at Genesee St., dating back to 1858, Sister Martina, president of the Hospital, announced that the need for the new structure is apparent.

The new structure consisting of a ground floor and five stories above will be so constructed as to provide for any future expansion. The building will be reinforced concrete with exterior of brick and stone to match the Nurses' Home.

The plan call for a complete hospital in every respect, with operating rooms for surgical medical and maternity cases.

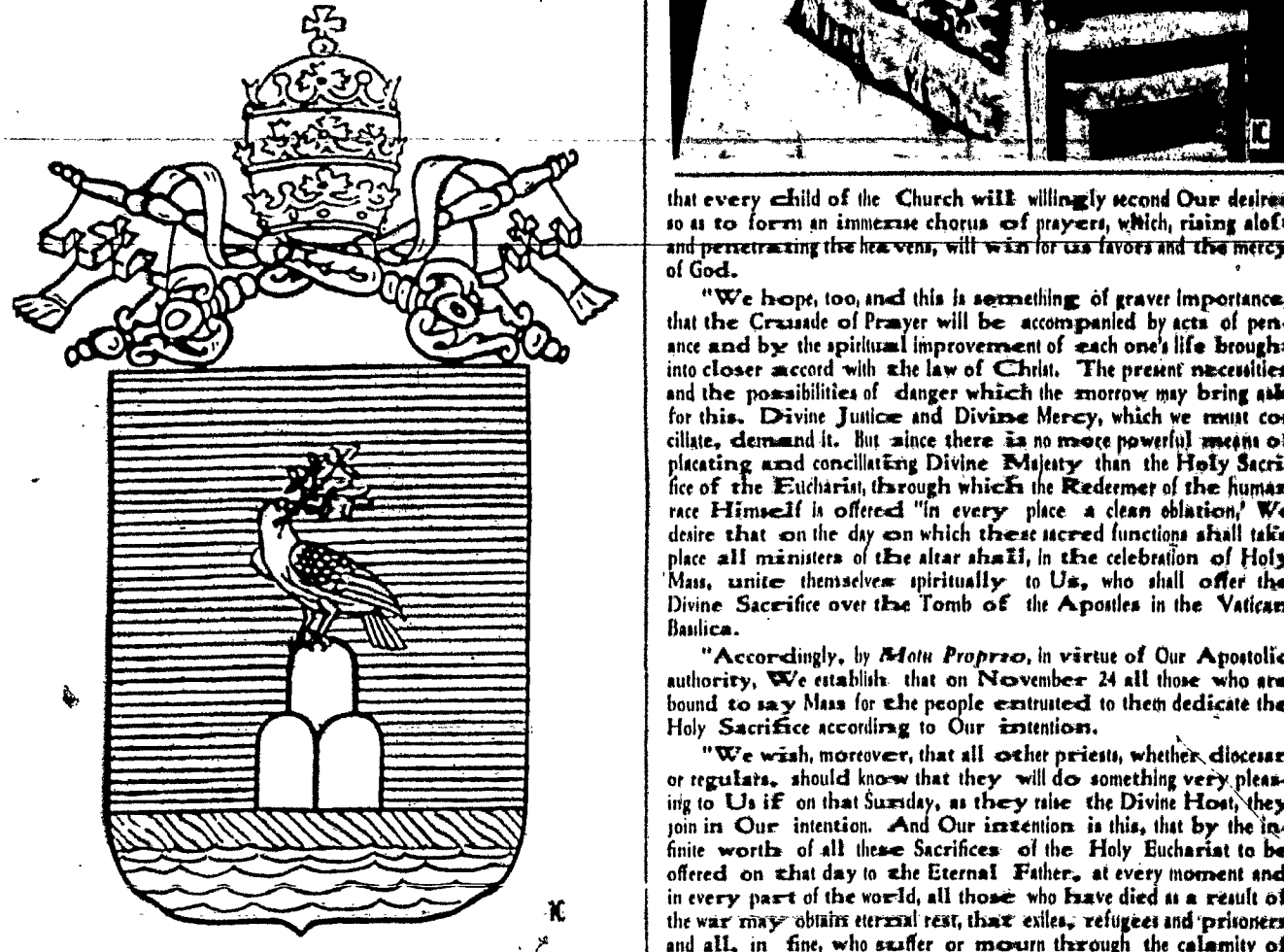
The Vatican Feast of Christ the King

Bishop Kearney Will Say Mass At Cathedral

Responding to the fervent appeal of His Holiness, Pope Pius XII to unite with him Sunday, Nov. 24 in devout prayer for victims of the war and restoration of peace in the world, His Excellency, the Most Rev. James E. Kearney calls upon every Catholic man, woman and child in the diocese to cooperate.

The "Day of Prayer" will be especially observed with solemn pontifical ceremonies at Sacred Heart Cathedral at noon, (12 M.) His Excellency will celebrate a Solemn Pontifical Mass and in the evening at 7:45 P. M. will officiate at Solemn Pontifical Vespers to be followed by Benediction of the Blessed Sacrament.

Dr. Connell T. Preach, Rector at the Mass will be preached by the Rev. Dr. Maynard Connell of St. Bernard's Seminary faculty. Exposition of the Blessed Sacrament throughout the day at the Cathedral is arranged.

Intense devotion are called for on the part of all diocesan, that day, in a letter sent by Bishop Kearney to all pastors and told last Sunday in the churches. His Excellency directs that:

"1. Every Catholic is requested to confess and receive Holy Communion and, at the solemn moment of Communion, to say a special prayer for the intention of the Holy Father.

"2. The Blessed Sacrament may be exposed for public adoration after the last Mass, a Holy Mass for Peace in the evening, and bring this exposition to a close.

"3. The High Mass may be a solemn Votive Mass for Peace (Miss. Pro. Pac.). The faithful should be encouraged to return to the Mass even though they have already attended Mass and received Communion.

"4. The importance of the day of prayer more vividly before the minds of the people, the Solemn Votive Mass may be added to the normal number of Masses, for example, at noon and a special prayer will be engaged for the occasion."

The Bishop concludes his pastoral letter with this appeal: "May I urge that the request of our Holy Father receive your sincere and generous cooperation. It is surely a time for deep and serious prayer."

Assisting the Bishop in the Solemn Pontifical Mass for peace at the Cathedral will be: Assistant Priest, the Rt. Rev. Msgr. George V. Burns; Deacons of honor, the Rev. Edward M. Lyons, rector of St. Andrew's Seminary and the Rev. Lawrence B. Casey, vice deacon; Deacon and Subdeacon of the Mass will be St. Mary's Seminary students; Minister of Ceremonies, the Rev. John T. Callahan. Minor offices will be taken by students of St. Andrew's Seminary.

A special musical program for the Pontifical Mass and Vespers will be sung by Sacred Heart Cathedral choir directed by Frank DeMarie.

MEXICAN STATE ACCEPTS COMMON LAW MARRIAGE

MEXICO CITY—The new Civil Code expedited by the Legislature of Tamaulipas, which went into force on Nov. 1, recognizes common law marriage.

Article 7 of Section VI defines marriage "for the purpose of the law" as "the union, living together and continued relationship of one man with one woman." Thus in Tamaulipas, such a union has the same legal status as a marriage which has been duly registered by the civil authorities in conformity with Mexican law.

Sea Halts School Tax Case

The Windsor Board of Education, which had been ordered to pay two shipments of school books, decided to appeal the decision.

that every child of the Church will willingly second Our desires so as to form an immense chorus of prayers, which, rising aloft and penetrating the heavens, will win for us favors and the mercy of God.

"We hope, too, and this is something of greater importance, that the Crusade of Prayer will be accompanied by acts of penance and by the spiritual improvement of each one's life brought into closer accord with the law of Christ. The present necessities and the possibilities of danger which the morrow may bring ask for this. Divine Justice and Divine Mercy, which we must conciliate, demand it. But since there is no more powerful means of pleading and conciliating Divine Majesty than the Holy Sacrifice of the Eucharist, through which the Redeemer of the human race Himself is offered in every place a clean oblation, we desire that on the day on which these sacred functions shall take place all ministers of the altar shall, in the celebration of Holy Mass, unite themselves spiritually to us, who shall offer the Divine Sacrifice over the Tomb of the Apostles in the Vatican Basilica.

"Accordingly, by Motu Proprio, in virtue of Our Apostolic authority, we establish that on November 24 all those who are bound to say Mass for the people entrusted to them dedicate the Holy Sacrifice according to Our intention.

"We wish, moreover, that all other priests, whether diocesan or regulars, should know that they will do something very pleasing to us if on that Sunday, as they raise the Divine Host they join in Our intention. And Our intention is this, that by the infinite worth of all these Sacrifices of the Holy Eucharist to be offered on that day to the Eternal Father, at every moment and in every part of the world, all those who have died as a result of the war may obtain eternal rest, that exiles, refugees and prisoners and all, in fine, who suffer or mourn through the calamity of the present conflict may have the heaven-sent comforts of grace, that, finally, order being restored in justice and minds being appeased through Christian charity, true peace may unite as brothers all the peoples of the human family, giving them back tranquility and prosperity."
