Pope Blesses Charities Meet

Prelate Stresses Charity Aim

CHICAGO (NC) — With a blessing from the Holy Father and the good wishes of His Excellency, the Most Rev. Cardinal Archbishop of Chicago, the National Conference of Charities met here this week. In addition to the Archbishop and Bishop, 2,000 delegates, 600 nuns and several hundred lay social workers attended the Solemn Pontifical Mass at which the Most Rev. Samuel A. Stritch, Archbishop of Chicago, officiated in the Cathedral of the Holy Name Sunday. The sermon was delivered by the Most Rev. Karl J. Alter, Bishop of Toledo.

At the conclusion of the Mass, the following message, signed by His Eminence Luigi Cardinal Magagnoli, Papal Secretary of State, was read:

"Occasion annual convention of National Conference of Catholic Charities and St. Vincent de Paul Society Holy Father greets members and imparts as pledge abundant divine favors, paternal Apostolic Blessing"

The convention delegates also heard the message in which the Apostolic Delegate in which he declared the Charities Conference and the St. Vincent de Paul Society are "cherished as worthy evidences of devoted Catholic life" in the United States and reminded that charity is "a vast and inexhaustible program of good works assigned by God to man."

"Under this program," His Excellency said, "inspired by the love of God, man desires and wishes effectively to assist his brethren by giving all that he can and should give to give part of himself, to sacrifice a portion of his time, his possessions, and his desired repose, to love even when that entails personal sacrifice."

In a nation-wide broadcast, Saturday night, Archbishop Stritch praised the work done by the two organizations and declared: "The fine things that Christian charity has put into our Christian culture it will preserve and above all it will insist that not only the weak be taken care of but also that the poor be allowed to give generously to the strong."

Christian charity, the Archbishop said, "is powerful to establish in this war-torn, afflicted, chaotic world true human solidarity, if men will only gather about the Cross of Calvary and, with their common Brother, Christ, reach up in perfect love to God Who then will reach down into them and there shall be in all that measure of happiness which in this life is possible."

A pre-convention meeting of Diocesan Directors of Catholic Charities was held Friday with the Rev. Erywan J. McEntegart, Director of the Division of Children of the New York Archdiocese Catholic Charities, presiding.

Saturday afternoon a round table discussion was held by participants in the convention which was broadcast over the NBC Blue Network. The discussions in the forum were the Most Rev. Vincent J. Ryan, Bishop of Bismarck, and President of the National Catholic Rural Life Conference, the Rev. Edward F. Swanson, of Brooklyn, N. Y., Lady Armstrong, President of the New York Ladies of Charity and Miss Mary Gibbons, First Deputy Commissioner of Welfare in New York City area.

The Very Rev. Magr. John R. Mulroy, President of the National Conference of Catholic Charities, in the presidential welcome said: "We are on the eve of a tremendous transition in the social and even spiritual lives of many people as well as in their outlook for the future. Everything that we say or do in Chicago must be weighed in the balance of Christian prudence and Christian charity."

stipulated that Montezuma Seminary, established near Las Vegas, N. Mex., for the training of Mexican candidates for the priesthood shall share in the funds raised through this collection.

This declaration of principles embraces the following points: Chaplains, fully qualified and approved by established religious bodies, shall be appointed in every institution, appropriate facilities and equipment for the conduct of religious ministrations shall be provided, the Chaplain shall be a resident in the institution.

LOS ANGELES SHOWS GAIN IN EDUCATION
LOS ANGELES—Catholic schools of the Archdiocese of Los Angeles have shown another sharp increase of enrollment for the year, every started in September, according to reports of the Rev. P. J. Dignana, Diocesan Superintendent of schools. Latest figures show an advance of about 1,800 pupils over the recorded 29,518 of the last school year.

NEW YORK—A frankly pagan "church" devoted to the worship of Aphrodite and the glorification of sex has been started here by Gleb Botkin, 39 years old, a Russian writer. The church has been incorporated in the state of New York at the Long Island Church of Aphrodite.

NEW YORK—The Holy Name Society of Chicago has been incorporated in the state of New York. The society was organized in Chicago in 1892 and has since that time been active in promoting the worship of the Holy Name of Jesus.

CHICAGO—The first branch office of the National Headquarters of the Holy Name Society has been opened here in charge of the Very Rev. William R. Lawler, O.P., widely known missionary and pulpiter orator.

TRUE CHARITY MILLION FOR RELIEF

Movie Trend Brings Warning From Bishops

WASHINGTON, NC—Strong protest against the increasing objectionable tendencies which lately have become manifest in films is registered in a statement issued here by the Episcopal Committee on Motion Pictures.

The statement, issued during the annual meeting here of the Archbishops and Bishops of the United States, urged all Catholics, especially parents, to "renew their vigilance against the pernicious influence of films which disregard the moral law and subvert the foundations of Christian society."

The statement notes efforts made by producers in the recent past to improve the moral character of motion picture entertainment, but warns that "some of the good ground gained has been lost."

Over Million Goes For Relief

WASHINGTON—A sum in excess of \$1,200,000 has been provided by the Bishops of the United States for relief of suffering peoples abroad. This amount is in addition to \$244,000 already collected, which Catholics throughout the country have contributed to general appeals for relief funds, such as the Red Cross roll calls and similar drives.

The sum mentioned also falls to take into consideration the contributions which American Catholics have made to the work of the Propagation of the Faith, some parts of whose funds must necessarily go to the relief of physical suffering in the Mission lands.

Catholic Youth Aid Organized

WASHINGTON—Establishment of a Department of Youth in the National Catholic Welfare Conference was authorized when the newly-elected Administrative Board of the NCWC met and organized.
