War Curtails Private School

Villanova Head Sees State Trend

A warning that a real danger exists "for the survival of Higher Education as it is presented by the privately controlled colleges and universities of the country," was brought to Rochester by the Rev. Edward V. Stanford, O.S.A., president of Villanova College.

Heads of four other Catholic institutions of higher learning joined in honoring Father Stanford in his capacity as President of the American Association of Colleges, the first Catholic to hold that office, at a dinner in the University Club sponsored by the Villanova Club of Rochester.

Presiding was His Excellency, the Most Rev. James B. Kearney, who as Bishop of Rochester is also president of St. Bernard's Seminary. Tributes to Father Stanford were expressed by the Rev. Joseph M. Noonan, C.M., president of Niagara University; the Rev. Hugh O'Donnell, C.S.C., president of Notre Dame University; and the Rt. Rev. Mgr. Joseph H. Grady, vice rector of St. Bernard's Seminary.

Some Philosophy Needed

All speakers voiced the need for a return in education to sound Christian philosophy. Father O'Donnell declared education should turn to "the highway of substance instead of the subway of method."

Present also at the speakers' table was the Rev. Dr. William J. Mahoney, C.M., Dean of Niagara University at Rochester; Paul E. Ronhaut, president of the Villanova Club of Rochester; and Bishop Kearney as presiding officer.

Catholic college alumni were called upon by Father Stanford to be alert to the menace to democracy and the threat of totalitarianism that impend "if unnecessary or unwelcome measures are adopted in the present emergency situation."

With greater disadvantages for the privately controlled colleges over the tax-supported institutions.

"Then we are hastening the collapse of our dual system of education and totalitarianism in education can quickly be ushered in," the educator declared.

"They talk about the privately controlled colleges as the rich man's colleges whereas state institutions are the colleges for the poor boy," the "poor" colleges. These slogans," said Father Stanford, "are clever catch phrases to enliven the sympathy of the unwary."

Offer Plan

The way to help under-privileged youth to obtain a college education is not by expanding state institutions. This is both unnecessary for the student and expensive for the taxpayer. The more intelligent and satisfactory plan would be to use existing institutions with their endowed scholarships, and by a liberal program of State Scholarships to make it possible for financially handicapped, but talented, youth to attend existing colleges. State institutions should be founded only to meet clearly existing needs that could not be cared for otherwise.

Difficulties besetting the privately-supported colleges with concentration calling young men with resultant loss in income were pointed out in contrast to the tax-supported institutions less dependent upon tuition.

Presenting the case for the privately supported colleges, Father Stanford said:

"I believe that they are the depositories of our Christian and cultural traditions. Inherently, they are those elements that make for the development of deep and abiding loyalties to a democratic way of life.

"Not being a governmental agency they have no inhibitions that would prevent them from acknowledging God as the creator and ruler of the universe and accepting Christ, His Son, as the Savior and the Divine teacher without peer.

Protects Freedom

"I believe that the privately supported colleges protect the integrity and freedom of publically controlled institutions. The privately supported college does not have to ask itself, what will the State Legislature think if we undertake this program? It does not have to say: will this or that act offend the leaders in government? It does not have to depend upon a lobby in the State Capitol to get funds."

"In this remaining free from undue political influence, the privately supported college is the protector of the freedom of the state controlled institution.

"I believe that the privately supported colleges are a bulwark of defense for the philosophy of democratic government.

"In the battle against the infiltration of totalitarian ideas in our government, it is the privately controlled colleges and universities that can stand against state control of thought and political control of education. Destroy our privately supported colleges and our state institutions may well become 'fifth columns' to prepare the way for ideas alien to democracy."

"As is generally accepted, widespread education is the price of democratic freedom," Father Stanford concluded. "Then the privately controlled college is the price of freedom by education. Without freedom in education, democracy cannot long endure."

"That education in the United States has gone a long way from the heritage our founding fathers gave us was the declaration of Father O'Donnell who cited the Northwest Ordinance of 1787 wherein it is stated that with religion, morality and knowledge necessary for the happiness of mankind, schools of such education for mankind should be encouraged."

Peace Prayers Sweep Nation In Veritable Tidal Wave

America's response to His Holiness Pope Pius XII's appeal that last Sunday being, rolled a tidal wave of applications.

The Archbishop and Bishops of the Shrine at the Catholic University were the special attention of their priests and people. The Ordinaries themselves took part in the observances, and the cathedrals became the focal point where the ceremonies of the various archdioceses and dioceses revolved.

Rochester Diocese Responds

The Diocese of Rochester responded wholeheartedly to the Holy Father's urgent appeal for prayers and devotions on Sunday, Nov. 24, with a "Day of Prayer" observed in churches throughout the diocese.

Altar rails were crowded at the earlier Masses as the faithful carried out the directions of His Excellency, Bishop Kearney, contained in his pastoral letter of the previous Sunday.

The impressive Solemn Pontifical Mass was celebrated by Bishop Kearney at Sacred Heart Cathedral at noon and the Solemn Pontifical Vespers in the evening left a deep impression on those participating.

People present at the Solemn Pontifical Mass heard an eloquent, logical and inspiring plea for uniting with the Holy Father in fervent prayers for peace from the Rev. Dr. Maynard Connell of St. Bernard's Seminary.

"Trust in God and belief in the efficacy of sincere supplications have been put far away by the world with its hatred, jealousy, excessive nationalism, bitter strife, war and all those evils that go with it," Father Connell said.

He gave a scholarly exposition of the repeated appeals for peace made by Pope Leo XIII, Benedict XV, Pope Pius XI, known as the Pope of Peace, and by the present reigning Pontiff.

"To them all the world has turned a deaf ear and has considered those foolish who seek to bring about peace by a direct appeal to God Almighty," the speaker said.

"We must prove ourselves worthy not only to ask but to receive," Father Connell declared. "We must ask ourselves whether in our love of God, it is such that we are not afraid to be called fools in the eyes of the world when asking God to bless us with peace."

Father Connell's message was "May you by your lives and enthusiasm inspire others to learn something of that 'folly' that God may smile on us with His Blessing and bring peace among men who believe and trust and love God."

Assisting the Bishop in the Mass were: the Rev. Mgr. George V. Burns, the Rev. Edward M. Lyons and the Rev. Lawrence B. Casey, students of St. Bernard's and St. Andrew's Seminaries.

With Bishop Kearney officiating at the episcopal throne, the St. Bernard's Seminary choir with the Rev. Benedict Ehmman at the organ sang the Solemn Pontifical Vespers. Sacred Heart Cathedral Choir sang the Benediction hymns. Benediction of the Blessed Sacrament was given by Monsignor Burns. Present in the sanctuary were the Rev. Joseph J. F. Goggin, the Rev. Joseph Sullivan and the Rev. John T. Callahan.

Bishop Alecastre Buried in Hawaii

HONOLULU—Dignitaries of the Church, civic authorities, army and police officials, representatives of the diplomatic corps and leaders of all religious denominations attended the funeral here of the Most Rev. Stephen Alecastre, SS.CC., Vicar Apostolic of Hawaii.

Solemn Requiem Mass was sung in the Cathedral of Our Lady of Peace by the Very Rev. Victorinus Claessen, SS.CC., Administrator of the Vicariate, and burial was in the vault of the Bishops in the old King Street Cemetery. The cemetery no longer is in use, but special permission was obtained to place the remains of Bishop Alecastre with those of his predecessors, the Bishops who previously ruled this Vicariate.

Bishop Alecastre died aboard the liner Matsonia while returning from the celebration of the centenary of the Hierarchy of California, his body was taken to the Cathedral where it lay in state until the funeral.
