GENEVA—(N. C.)—While the Concordat the Hitler Government solemnly entered into with the Holy See has been flagrantly broken in most of its basic stipulations, while the extensive and flourishing Catholic school system of Germany has been smashed to pieces, while the whole Catholic duty press and a large number of Catholic magazines in that country have been suppressed and hundreds of prosperous Catholic associations have been dissolved, the Nazi propaganda machine, which has been primarily distributed for foreign consumption, brazenly declares in its latest issue that "religious life in Greater Germany is unimpeded."

Pope Hopes For Truce At Christmas

"Let us hope and trust, the Holy Father said, that at least during that holy night and that holy day either spontaneously or through reciprocal agreement, a truce might be concluded among the belligerents so that the din of arms will not surmount the angelic concert of peace which will be repeated in the sacred temples and that there will be no shedding of blood to disturb and diminish the heavenly joy of that hour."

The Pontiff granted faculties regarding the celebration of Masses in the afternoon of Christmas Eve on the following conditions: A fast of four hours must be observed by the celebrant of the Mass and by the priest who receives Holy Communion, a priest who celebrates Mass on the afternoon of Christmas Eve may celebrate only two Masses on Christmas Day, observing a fast from midnight, the faithful may receive Communion at the afternoon Mass even though they have received on the morning of the same day, but they may not receive again on Christmas Day, attendance at Mass on the afternoon of Christmas Eve is valid fulfillment of the obligation to attend Mass on Christmas Day.

'Convent' Publishers Heed Protests on Book

LONDON (N. Alyse Simpson wrote a letter to the Catholic Truth Society here regarding her references to "lunatic nuns."

In printing the letter the University asked the publishers of the book, J. M. Dent and Sons, if they would continue to issue the book with the statement, written by the late Evelyn Powys, declaring that the book is "the authentic story of a young girl's life in a Catholic convent where... the mad rites of the Brides of Heaven expire on the unheeding air."
