Behold A Great Priest

The life story of Archbishop Hickey gives us a picture of a devoted man of God, in whom we behold a great priest.

In all his days he pleased God. In early youth he gave earnest attention to the call of Jesus Christ to leave home and parents and come follow Him, giving up earthly hopes and ambitions.

At St. Andrew's Seminary, at St. Joseph's Provincial Seminary at Troy, he studied and planned for the life that lay ahead. Wholeheartedly did he give himself to the seminary program so wisely conceived by the Church as a fit preparation for a priestly career.

Ordination to the Priesthood came in due course to fulfill his highest hopes. He could now stand at the altar and offer sacrifice for the living and the dead; he could gather in souls for God through Baptism and Penance.

Consecration as a Bishop meant for him only added power to work for God's Church, more ample opportunity to spend himself for the souls of men.

Bishop Hickey had to develop the work so well begun, and to meet other pressing problems. The large number of immigrants and their children called for his immediate attention.

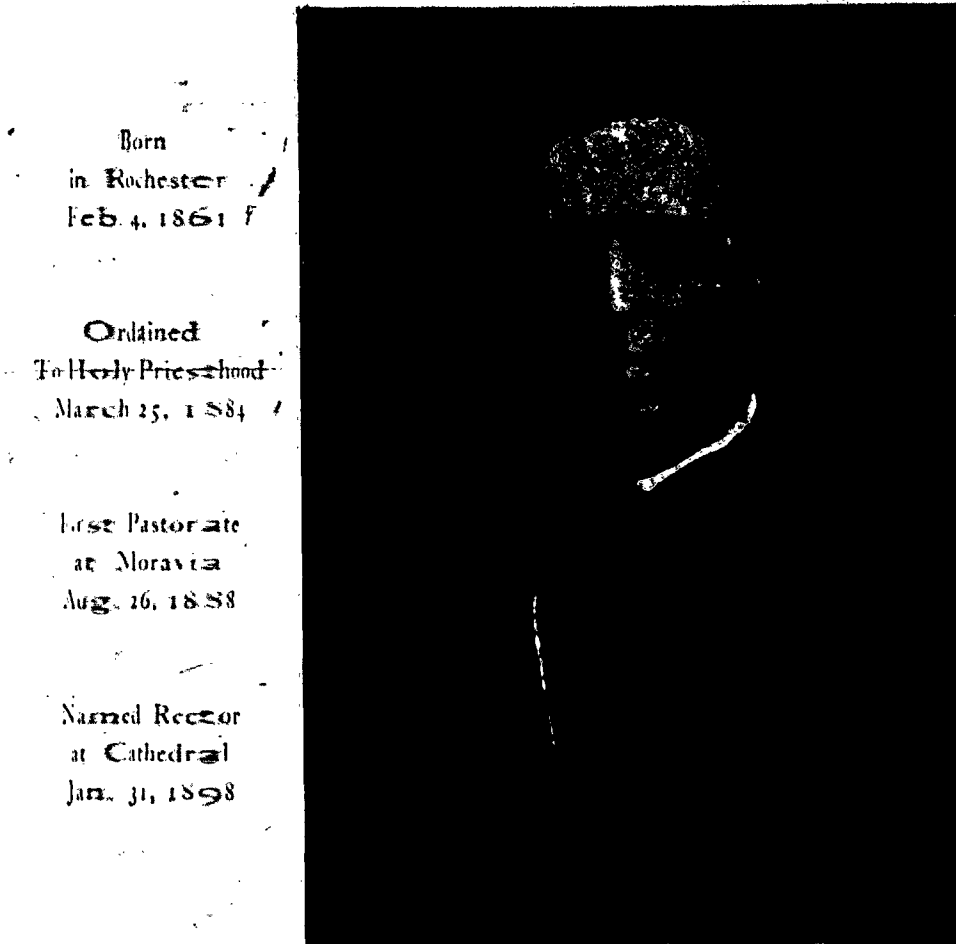
A founder of the Rochester Community Chest, he remained on its Board till 1928. He founded the Catholic Women's Club, instituted the Holy Name Society in the diocese.
