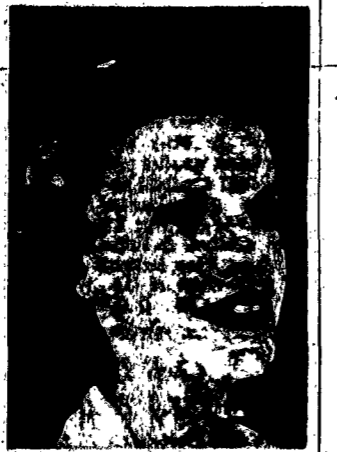

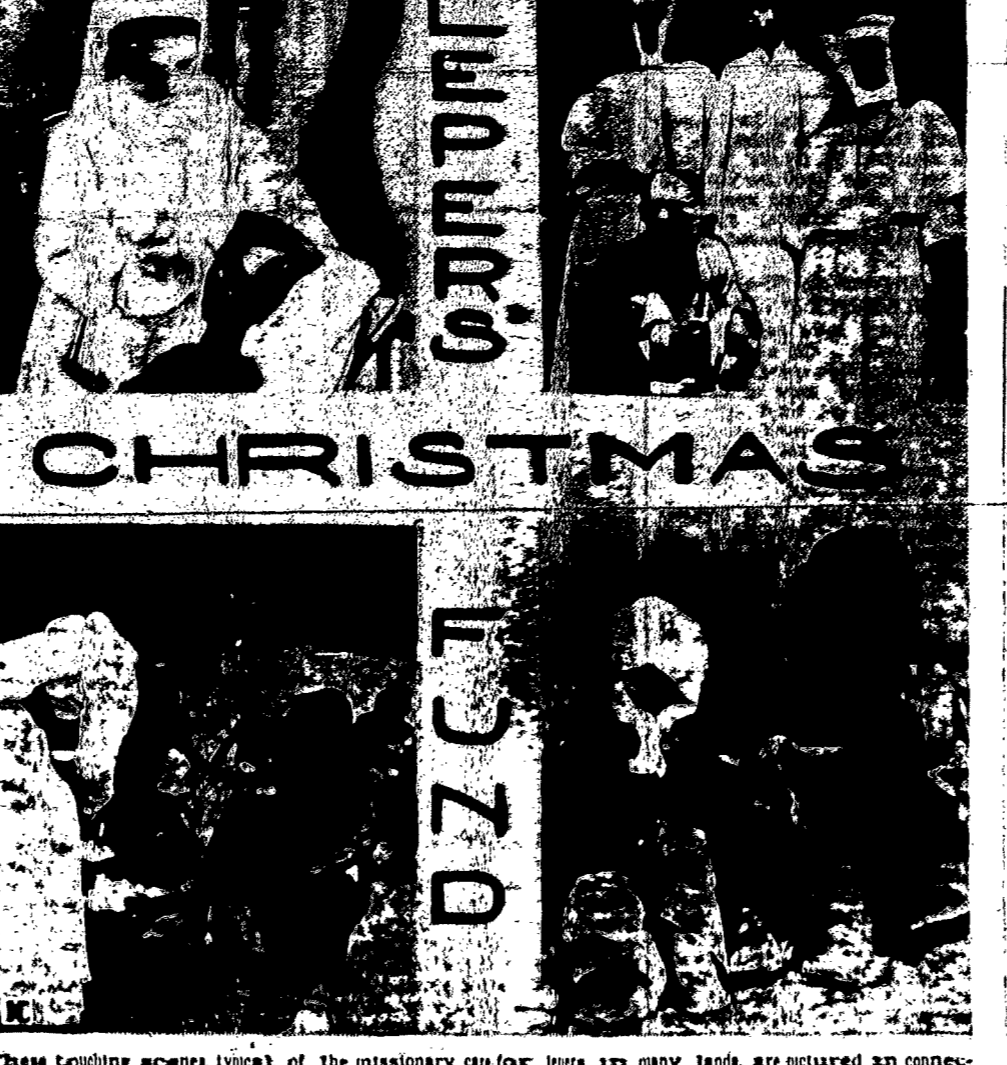

Catholics will be glad to know that crucifixes made from wood of the old St. Patrick's Cathedral, are now on sale by C. H. Wegman. Each is 7 inches by 13 inches and may be had in chestnut, walnut or oak wood with bronze or silver corpus. On each cross is the inscription:

**'Peace To Men Of Good Will'**

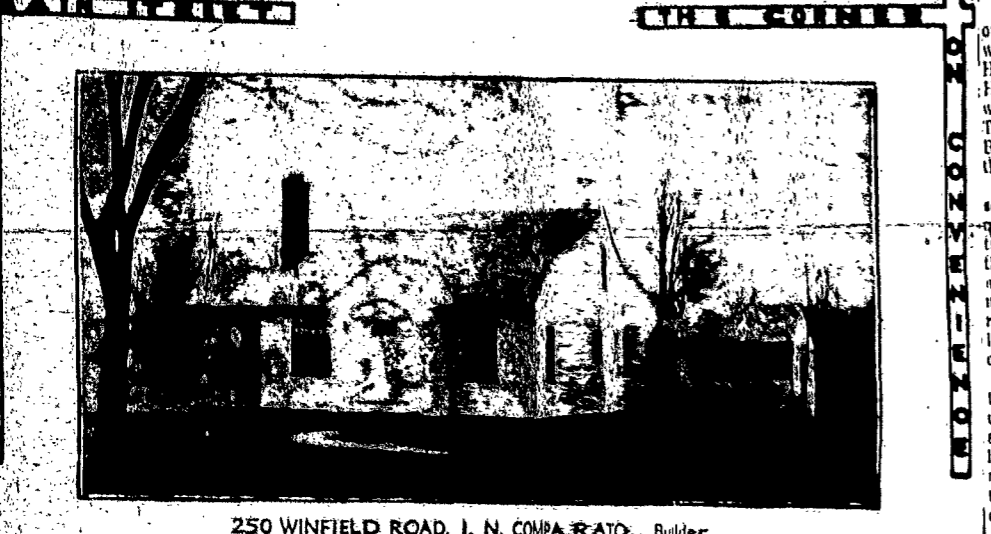
