47th Dublin Archbishop Consecrated

DUBLIN (NC) The Most Rev. J. C. McQuaid, becoming the forty-seventh Archbishop of Dublin here at ceremonies attended by dignitaries of Church and State, including Premier Eamon De Valera. The new ordinary is one of the three youngest Bishops of Ireland and the youngest Archbishop in Ireland or Britain.

The consecration and accompanying ceremonies constituted an outstanding event for the devout residents of Dublin and climaxed the weeks since Archbishop McQuaid's appointment to this archdiocese which were marked by an outpouring of joy and felicitations from all classes, including practically all the ranking dignitaries in Ireland, native and foreign.

Born at Cooltehill, Cavan County, in 1893, the new Archbishop comes of a family with a long medical tradition and is one of the few prelate members of the Guild SS. Luke, Cosmos and Damien for Catholic doctors.

In 1919 he entered the novitiate of the Holy Ghost Fathers at Kingsmead Manor here and was ordained in St. Mary's College, Rathmines, in 1923. His course at the National University was marked by many outstanding successes, including the Delaney Prize, first class honors and scholarship each year. While at the university he studied Oriental languages in preparation for the Licentiate in Sacred Scripture of the Biblical Commission at the Vatican. In November, 1925, he studied in this course were interrupted when he was recalled to Belkrook College to fill the office of Dean of Studies. However, he added a Higher Diploma in Education to his attainments and his studies in Philosophy and Theology won him a Doctorate of Theology in Rome.

Distinguished As Educator
The new Archbishop's chief work has been as an educator, being widely recognized as an authority in that field. As Chairman of the Catholic Headmasters' Association for many years he has played a highly important part in bringing about reforms and improving methods of education in this country.
