AUBURN—The first fatal accident of the New Year occurred at 10:30 p. m. on Jan. 7, when John F. Hanley, suffered injuries which resulted in his death two hours later. Mr. Hanley also suffered a broken right leg, a fractured left ankle and other injuries. Mr. Hanley is survived by three sisters, Agnes, Rita and Mary Hanley, and a brother, James Hanley, all of Auburn. Funeral services were held at the family home at 10:30 o'clock Saturday morning with further services in St. Mary's Church at 11 o'clock.

Mr. Bannon then introduced and turned the program over to Mr. Roberto Lampaglia, toastmaster.

Miss Patricia Barry, the alumni speaker, greatly surprised her audience when after her introduction she produced a large purple bound volume with the gold-lettered title, "Holy Family 1934-40." The guest speaker was Rev. Donald M. Healy, a former assistant at Holy Family, and now Catholic chaplain at Cornell University.
