Radio Expose Of Persecution Irks Nazis

GENEVA (NC)—Recent criticism of Nazi policies expressed in the course of German language broadcasts from the Vatican, particularly in regard to the treatment of Catholics in Poland, have aroused the ire of the cases of the Hitler regime.

The Nazi-controlled press has made an attempt to blunt the persecution inflicted upon helpless Polish peasants by a series of broadcasts from the Vatican. The Polish clergy as a whole had always been so bitter and German that they should not be surprised if measures of repression were adopted against them.

But the Nazi regime still claims that criticism of these conditions is not in keeping with the spirit of the Concordat of the Holy See with Germany, and completely disregards the fact that this very Concordat has been broken time and again by Germany.

Bishop Flays Catholics' Status In North Erin

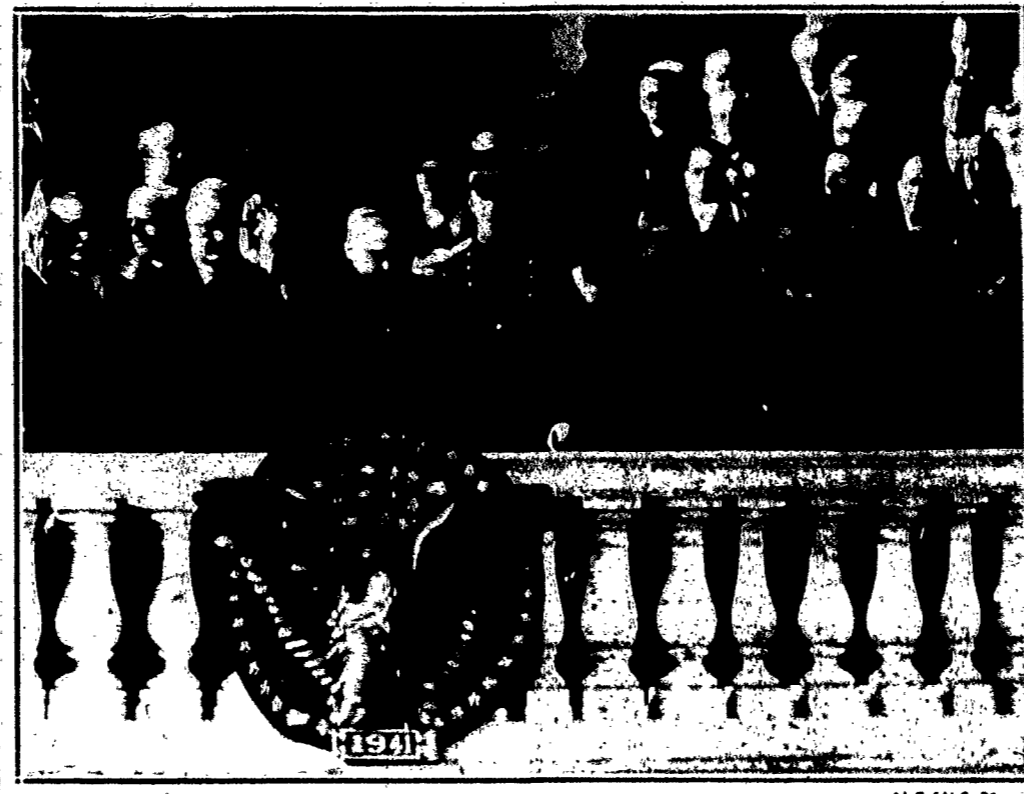
