While a full attendance of representatives of affiliated organizations is desired, only Catholic women interested are invited.

The Chaplains' Aid Association has revealed the need for 70,000 pieces of altar linen to be made this winter to help equip the constantly growing altars of the Catholic churches with the United States armed forces.

An editorial in the December issue of the Association's publication announces "a call to the arms of the Catholic women of America." "The Chaplains' Aid Association," the editorial declares, "will need thousands of altar linens of all sorts, and it will need them soon. Before next June, there will be 100 Catholic churches in the U. S. Army and Navy (there are about 100 at present). This means that efforts to supply the needs of these chaplains must be quadrupled as soon as a humane possibility for the new chaplains who are to be commissioned. Each outfit contains 21 linens of various sizes, in addition to a linen alb and cincture. Any post-war situation, therefore, will also need the linens necessary for their altars. It is a great task and one that must be faced immediately. It will mean days and months of devoted work on the part of Catholic women."

What was accomplished during the World War was stupendous. Only the Chaplains' Aid workers of that day could testify to the prodigious quantities of altar linens which are made every quarter of the country. So many that for a few years afterward the linen supply was there to be drawn upon.

"What could be done once, can be done again. If these zealous Catholic women can but know where to direct their generous work."

We call upon the splendid women organized in the National Council of Catholic Women and other Catholic units to take this pious work to heart.

Our Rochester Executive Office has already obtained detailed instructions for making these altar linens at the request of a group of our women and will be most happy to supply this information to others.

Here is a missionary work that should appeal to all.
