Pastors were named to Holy Apostles and Holy Family Churches, Rochester, and to St. Joseph's Church, Wayland, by His Excellency, the Most Rev. James E. Keane, D.D., Bishop of Rochester, in an appointment which will take effect March 15, 1941, as follows:

The Rev. George V. Fredmore has been transferred as Pastor of St. John the Evangelist Church, Spencerport, and of St. Louis Church, Hilton, and has been appointed as Pastor of Holy Family Church, Rochester.

The Rev. William W. Heisel, Ph.D., has been transferred as Pastor of St. Joseph's Church, Wayland, and has been appointed as Pastor of Holy Family Church, Rochester.

The Rev. Adalbert J. Schneider has been transferred as Assistant Pastor Holy Redeemer Church, Rochester, and has been appointed as Pastor of St. Joseph's Church, Wayland.

Father Fredmore has been pastor of St. John the Evangelist Church, Spencerport, and of St. Louis Church, Hilton, since 1926. He was born in St. Louis and made his studies for the Holy Priesthood at St. Andrew's and St. Bernard's Seminary, and was ordained on June 2, 1921. His first assignment was as assistant pastor of St. Mary's Church, Plover, and he served later as pastor of St. Andrew's and St. Bernard's Seminary, and as pastor of St. Louis Church in Hilton.

During his fifteen years' apostolic service, Father Fredmore has effected many improvements. He established the women's guild, and brought the Sisters of St. Joseph to town and built a convent.

An accomplished musician, Father Fredmore is organist at St. Andrew's and St. Bernard's Seminary and the Holy Family Church. A frequent lecturer, he has organized a dramatic club, and has been a frequent speaker at various religious functions.

Father Heisel also a native of Rochester, prepared for the Holy Priesthood at St. Andrew's and St. Bernard's Seminary, and was ordained on June 9, 1935.

His first assignment was as Assistant Pastor at Holy Redeemer Church where he founded the Holy Redeemer Athletic Association. After being an Assistant Pastor at St. Andrew's and St. Bernard's Seminary, he was appointed pastor of Holy Family Church, Rochester, where he now becomes pastor.

Father Heisel was appointed Pastor of St. Joseph's Church, Wayland, in May, 1938.

During his pastorate in Wayland, the modern school building was completed in 1931 and rebuilt in 1935. The church was beautifully repaired.

He is a brother of Capt. George Heisel, of the Rochester Post Office, and of the late Rev. Raymond G. Heisel, of Elmira, N. Y.

Young Crusaders Show 20% Gain In Final Figures

A smashing total of 6866 subscription orders is the youthful and jubilant school crusaders' answer to Bishop Kearney's Catholic Press Month appeal, final tabulations at Crusade headquarters revealed today.

Results in the year's crusade in the schools are 20 per cent better than last year in revenue and show a gratifying percentage of new orders.

A preliminary check shows 175 new orders obtained in the crusade conducted by the school children.

While the crusade effort in parishes is still being carried on in parishes without schools and particularly in those parishes where special conditions exist which make thorough Crusade activity during the "Catholic Press Month" difficult.
