According To The Doctor

A dangerous habit common to many people is that of wearing overcoats or other outside garments in churches, halls and auditoriums. A person thus clad in a public room, which is the majority of instances is overheated, has procured for himself all the elements of a hot-air and steam bath combined. His undergarments become damp. In a state of perspiration he goes out after a hour or so to brave the cold and biting air. The perspiration is checked as it turned off by a stopcock, the chilled blood goes to the inner organs in a torrent, and he becomes shivers, chilled and susceptible. If the wraps are at once removed, the chill is still more perceptible. Children are prone to disregard these cautions as well as many adults.

A third statement may be made relative to exposing a heated and overworked throat to freezing air. Cold air is not to be inhaled under any circumstances without warming it through the nasal passages, or if you prefer breathe through your mouth, then through a handkerchief. But to suck in great swallows of freezing air after a long period of smoking, or speaking, or conversing inside is to court bronchial trouble.

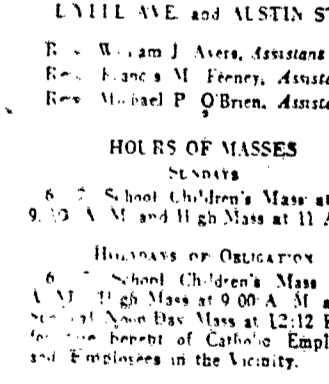
