The Rev. Bernard LeFrois, S. V. D., of Rochester; the Rev. John Maney, formerly of Geneva, and Joseph Egan, Honesdale, a student at the North American College in Rome, were among 450 American priests, seminarians and nuns who returned to America as Italy entered the European war.

The Rev. Lee G. Schwab was named as the first pastor of a new church in honor of Our Lady of Lourdes, which the Most Rev. James E. Kearney established in West Seneca.

The Rev. Robert J. Gannon, S. V. D., President of Fordham University, delivered the Commencement address at Nazareth College from which a class of 53 graduates was conferred.

The Most Rev. James E. Kearney announced an immediate plan for Nazareth College and said ground would be broken for the first time.

The new wing of the Nazareth College is located in Lake Avenue, with a cost of \$153,000. The Most Rev. James E. Kearney, Bishop of the Diocese of Rochester, is the benefactor of the building.

With thousands taking pledges of the National Organization for Decent Literature, with the collection of co-operation from stores and stands selling magazines, the campaign proceeded.

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The Congregation of Sisters of St. Joseph in the Rochester Diocese branched out into the mission field for the first time with the announcement that four nuns would be sent to Selma, Alabama, to take up their work in the negro mission of St. Elizabeth's.

In an impressive ceremony at Dunn Memorial Chapel, Elmira, the Most Rev. James E. Kearney, Bishop of the Diocese of Rochester, invested 147 Elmira Ladies of Charity members—the first affiliation in the diocese.

At the 69th annual commencement exercises of St. Andrew's Seminary, 16 graduates were administered by Bishop Kearney to hold fast to the ideals instilled during seminary years.

The Rev. John M. Ball, pastor of St. Rose's Church, Lima, celebrated his Sacredotal Silver Jubilee with Solemn High Mass Sunday, June 16. He was assisted by his brother, the Rev. Edward H. Ball at deacon and the Rev. Edmund Magoo as sub-deacon.

Fertilized with good Catholic training, 647 boys and girls graduated from Catholic High Schools of the Diocese of Rochester. The Most Rev. James E. Kearney presided at each of the exercises. In a letter to parents he said they have had a deeply religious atmosphere during the years in school and need to be in the same atmosphere when they go to college.

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Sacred Heart, July 4 "for the peace and preservation of the United States." Catholics throughout the diocese had been called for prayer on this day.

Ground was broken by the Most Rev. James E. Kearney for a new Nazareth College to be built on the grounds west of the Sisters of St. Joseph Motherhouse, Pittsford, July 5. This ceremony followed ceremonies of reception and profession of 17 novices who pronounced Perpetual Vows.

Polish Falcons of America, 2,000 strong, holding a four-day athletic carnival in Rochester, attended Solemn High Mass celebrated by the Rev. Seweryn Niedbalski, national chaplain, at St. Stanislaus Church.

Children of St. Patrick's and St. Mary's Home and those who were housed in the former St. Joseph's Orphan Asylum, will go into new, modern cottage-type homes in June, 1941, the Chancery announced. They are to be built on the diocesan-owned Clark farm in Dewey Avenue.

Alban J. Linnenbach, well known Catholic layman, died at his home at 77 Nelson Street, Auburn.

Restoration of world peace was the intention of a Novena at St. Ann's Church, Hornell, with the Rev. Peter Starin, C.S.S.R., preaching at the services.

Michael F. Larkin of Rome asked 100 Knights of Columbus, delegates to the Central New York Chapter meeting at Auburn, to oppose the forces of "No God, No Christ" with strong, unified effort.

Mrs. Antonia Gonzalez, a member of the State Commission of Correction, was guest of honor at a tea given by the Elmira Ladies of Charity at the Elmira Country Club.

The Rev. William F. Sheehan, pastor of St. Patrick's Church in Binghamton, who was a graduate of St. Bernard's Seminary, died in that city.

The Rev. John S. Randall, diocesan director of the Society for the Propagation of the Faith, appealed for gifts to furnish the Mission Home which the Sisters of St. Joseph were to establish in Alabama.

Ninety-three per cent of magazine dealers signified their intention to cooperate in the Bishop's Campaign for Decent Literature in the diocese.

Sister M. Teresa Hayes, teacher of English in Nazareth Academy for more than 20 years, died at the Nazareth Motherhouse in Pittsford July 19.

Bernard E. Finneane, prominent Catholic layman, was made president of the Security Trust Company.

- Cutting and trimming grass;
- Filling sunken graves and resodding same;
- Renewing foundations, where necessary, to keep all markers on lot in proper position.

ANNUAL CARE COST

(Required on all lots purchased before April 1, 1925)

Lots purchased before above date were listed at a price that made no provision for continued care but only for the value of the land.

Owing to the growth of Holy Sepulchre and the rapidly increasing cost of maintaining grounds in proper condition, it has become necessary to charge lot owners or their heirs for the ordinary care of above described lots.

Under a recent regulation passed by the Cemetery, individual lots are subject to an annual fee for cutting and trimming grass on same. Charge for this labor varies according to size of lots:

- 2 and 4 grave lots, \$1.00 per season
- 6 and 7 grave lots, 1.50 per season
- 12 and 14 grave lots, 2.00 per season
