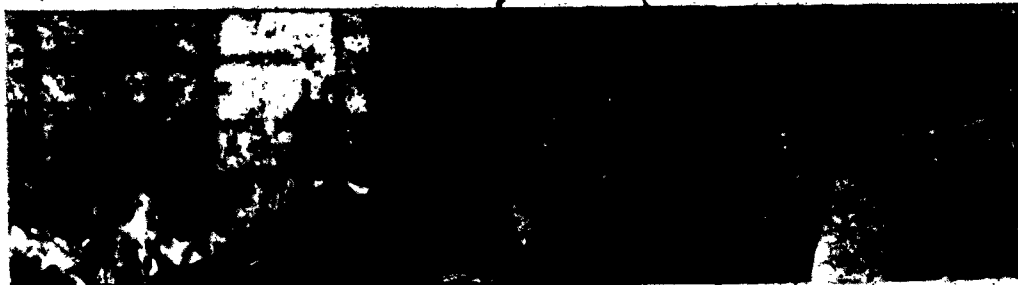

Two Sisters of Notre Dame marked their golden jubilee in the order at Holy Family Church Saturday, July 20. They are Sister M. Lorenzo, who was at Sacred Heart School, Baltimore, 49 years, and Sister M. Charles of Holy Family School, Rochester, where she has been 33 years. The Rev. Joseph H. Gelfell celebrated Solemn High Mass.

AUGUST, 1940

The Rev. John M. Duffy, Superintendent of Catholic Schools in the Diocese of Rochester, indicated that about 26,000 pupils would enter the elementary and secondary schools of the diocese—a part of the 2,006,071 total to be enrolled throughout the United States. Fundamental Christian teachings as offered in Catholic schools, constitute the basis of world peace, it was said.

The date for the fourth public ceremony for Blessing of Expectant Mothers was set for Sept 12 in the chapel of St. Joseph's Church, Rochester.

A \$250,000 goal for the Nazareth College campaign was set by the Most Rev. James E. Kearney, Bishop of Rochester, with announcement that the campaign would be started October 21.

The Reverend Mother Rose Miriam announced that these Sisters of St. Joseph had been selected for the mission for colored people at Selma, Alabama: Sister Frances Marie Keough, Sister Catherine Charlotte Hyland, Sister Mary Ann Stasia McCormick, Sister Frances De Sales Murphy and Sister Mary Ellen Dundon.

Five thousand children from pre-school to the high school completed their courses in 58 Religious Vacation Schools in the diocese.

First spiritual retreat of Ladies of Charity of Elmira began August 13 at St. Charles Church, Elmira Heights, with the Rev. Thomas J. Coffey, S.J., of the Loyola House of Retreats, Morristown, N. J., as Retreat Master.

A beautiful American flag was presented by the Knights of Equity to Camp Stella Maris, with Sir Knight Walter Simpson making the presentation.

A Novena of Peace was opened at Cliff Haven Summer School.

Nazareth Alumnae arranged for four concerts instead of three to be given under its auspices by the Rochester Summer Symphony Orchestra at Highland Park.

The Rev. Robert M. Fischette, 1529 Clifford Avenue, and the Rev. Leo G. Klem, 3746 St. Paul Boulevard, newly ordained Basilican priests, returned to their home parishes to say first Masses.

The Rev. James W. Fischer, 59, pastor of St. Patrick's Church, Moravia, died unexpectedly Tuesday, August 27, at Quebec, Canada, where he had gone for a fishing trip.

SEPTEMBER, 1940

To sanctify this holiday dedicated to the working man, the Votive Mass of St. Joseph, the Carpenter, was offered by the Most Rev. James E. Kearney in spiritual observance of Labor Day at the Pro-Cathedral of the Sacred Heart.

Cyril J. Stalt was appointed Master of the Fifth District, Fourth Degree, Knights of Columbus.

Miss Laura K. Schilling of Rochester was named President of the New York State Branch, National Catholic Women's Union.

St. Francis de Sales school building at Geneva, completely remodeled after a disastrous fire in February, was inspected by a large number of visitors.

Miss Jane M. Flannigan, assistant secretary of Geneva Chamber of Commerce, resigned to become a member of the faculty of Nazareth College.

Sister M. Vincent Deneffe died September 1 at the Mother House of the Sisters of St. Joseph, Pittsford.

The Rt. Rev. Msgr. J. F. Goggin, rector of St. Bernard's Seminary, consecrated a beautiful new liturgical altar in the Major Seminary Chapel.

Ten thousand persons who went to Holy Sepulchre Cemetery for the solemn ceremony of Blessing the Graves were told by the Most Rev. James E. Kearney that they could find consolation in prayers to Our Lady of Sorrows.

With solemn ceremonies of farewell, five Sisters of St. Joseph left the Mother House at Pittsford to take up mission work among the negroes of the South.

Tributes of sorrow and of affection were paid Sister M. Matrella, principal of Nazareth Academy during 58 of its 59 years of existence, who died September 17.

Christian democracy was emphasized at the Diocesan Teachers' Institute at Aquinas Institute, with different speakers stressing the need for better citizenship.

Sisters of St. Joseph announced they would give 20 scholarships valued at \$1,000 each in Nazareth College, for distribution to girls thus helping to arouse enthusiasm in the five deaneries of the diocese, for a campaign to raise \$250,000 for the college.

Ideal weather helped to bring out a great number of people at the annual ceremony of Blessing the Graves in St. Patrick's Cemetery at Geneva.

Our Lady of Lourdes, new West Elmira church, instituted campaign to raise \$10,000.

The "Achilles," senior year book of Holy Family High School at Auburn, won first honors in the nation wide survey of the Catholic School Press Association.

With leaders in the church, industry, labor and the field of economics taking part in discussions, the Catholic Conference on Industrial Problems at Columbus Civic Centre was a success.

Announcement was made that Simon N. Stein and John L. Keenan would serve as co-chairmen with Frank E. Gannett, who headed the special committee to raise \$250,000 for Nazareth College.

William J. Fuehrer and former Judge Phillip H. Donnelly presented reports on the national convention of the Catholic Central Verein of America at a joint meeting of the Rochester branches of this organization and the National Catholic Women's Union.

Our Lady of Mount Carmel Church, beautified with new decorations, marked the event with celebration of Solemn High Mass by the pastor, the Rev. Charles J. Azzi. Bishop Kearney praised the devotion of pastor and parishioners to the House of God.

St. Michael's Church in Clinton Avenue North marked its Golden Jubilee with a solemn procession of parish organizations and Pontifical High Mass celebrated by the Most Rev. James E. Kearney.

OCTOBER, 1940

The Rev. Daniel M. Gleason, C.S.C., a former member of the New York City Police Department, was one of the missionaries at the Church of St. Ann, Hornell, receiving his initiation in mission work there.

With 1,000 parishioners in attendance, Bishop Kearney opened the Novena to Our Lady of the Miraculous Medal in Corpus Christi Church.

Raymond A. Kelly was elected president of St. Peter and Paul's Parish Credit Union, the fifth credit union in the city.

The Rt. Rev. William M. Hart, Vicar General of the Diocese, officiated at the laying of the cornerstone of the St. Francis of Assisi Recreation Hall.

Observance of the Feast of Christian Doctrine Oct. 27 focused attention of the importance of catechetical teaching.
