MacSweeney To Head Tuberculosis Association

Press Hailed As Aid To Cooperation In Health Program

Joseph P. MacSweeney, chairman of the Tuberculosis and Health Association and chairman since 1930 of its Rochester division, was elected Association president at the twenty-third annual meeting of the association held at the Hotel Seneca, April 2.

John C. Malloch of Churchville was elected first vice-president and selected chairman of the Health Committee of the Association. Dr. John J. Lloyd and Dr. Benjamin J. Slater of Erie were elected vice-presidents; Frank G. O'Leary of Buffalo, president of the Erie branch, Dr. E. B. Sobie and Dr. George E. Sanders, of Greece, assistant treasurers, and Raymond H. Greenman secretary.

A new Committee on Plan and Scope was created with Dr. Sawyer, Dr. Albert D. Kaiser and Isaac Adler, former presidents as well as Association officers, serving as members.

Rochester Committee office was elected, in addition to Mr. MacSweeney, chairman, include Dr. Lloyd, Harry B. Crowley and E. A. Roser, vice-chairmen. New members include Dr. Charles T. Lunford and Harold Sanford. New members elected to the Association Board of Directors include Dr. Paul Egan, John G. Gould, Dr. James L. Mangano, Mr. Floyd B. Newell, Mrs. May J. Forrester, Edith M. Leading the efforts of the Tuberculosis and Health Association and cooperating agencies to find and diagnose cases of tuberculosis which spread latent infection, Dr. LoGrasso, superintendent of J. N. Y., as guest and principal speaker at the twenty-third annual meeting of the Association at the Seneca, stated that experience has taught that there are certain groups that are more susceptible to tuberculosis than others.

Comments on the progress of cooperation in the Erie League-Campaign, Dr. LoGrasso stated that publicity is the main factor in putting across any health program requiring the cooperation of many people.

"Premarital examinations for syphilis could well include an examination for tuberculosis as well," Dr. LoGrasso, who characterized tuberculosis as an unnecessary evil and burden. "The question is not continued by LoGrasso, but we eradicate tuberculosis, but we take the steps necessary to suc-

Faith Stories
For Little Ones

Marathon of St. Elizabeth
You do not perhaps know that in the early days of the Church, Friday was kept not only as a day of abstinence, but as a fasting day. In the time of our blessed Lord's death, noon was permitted to much food until 1 o'clock in the afternoon, the hour at which he expired.

Next it happened that St. Praxedis, Bishop of Traragan, in Spain, being condemned to death for refusing to adhere to the false gods, was led to execution on a Friday morning along with two of his deacons. They had been condemned to be burnt alive in the public amphitheater and as they were conducted thither they were attended by vast crowds of people, eager to receive the last dying blessing of the holy man, who would be burned alive by Christians and pagans. Some of these his refreshments on the way, and begged him to take at least a cup of wine, although he had before his hearty but he replied, "I am as yet but the tenth hour."

The martyrs were fastened to wooden stakes, and the flames consumed the bodies, which they were ordered, till their arms at liberty which they extended in the form of a cross in this posture they died before the flames touched their bodies, and at the same moment the executioners were seen to open their happy souls to enter therein crowned with high dignities of glory. — Butler's Saints.

QUERIES and REPLIES

Q.—Is it sinful for a Catholic to be a witness at a civil marriage?
A.—Even when a priest is not available parents should not baptize their own children, since it is becoming that the spiritual parent and the carnal parent be different persons. (Meluhg and Callan Moral Theology, vol. II, p. 648.) If however the parents cannot obtain another Catholic layman to administer the sacrament, then one of the parents may do it, preferably the father.

Q.—Is it wrong for a father to baptize his own child in case of an emergency?
A.—Even when a priest is not available parents should not baptize their own children, since it is becoming that the spiritual parent and the carnal parent be different persons. (Meluhg and Callan Moral Theology, vol. II, p. 648.)
