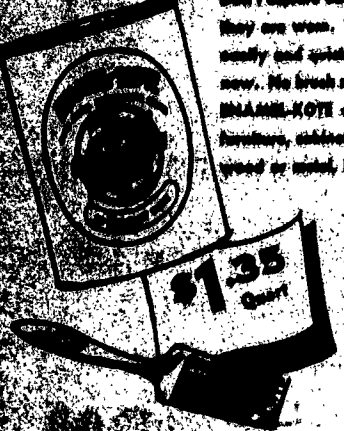

widely divergent Christian groups in a great nation now at war have publicly accepted the five points as basic principles for a just peace and commanded them to the consideration of their government. This action is an inspiration to all who have the cause of true Christian peace at heart. Those who so lightly dismiss high-minded statements of principle as hopelessly idealistic in which they would call a war of hard facts, can find no comfort in the pronouncements of the Pope. But those who long for a world in which men and nations care, if they will, open their hearts to Christian truth and mold their lives on Christian principles find heartening support in his brave words.

Compare the two readings of the last sentence in the second paragraph of the old text: "They said therefore: What is this that he saith: A little while? We know not what he speaketh. The revised text: They kept saying therefore, 'What is this little while of which he speaks? We do not know what he is saying.' 'She remembereth no more' is changed to 'she no longer remembers.'"

THE GOSPEL ACCORDING TO ST. JOHN Chapter 16, Verses 16 to 22

"A little while and you shall see me no longer; and again a little while and you shall see me, because I go to the Father."
