On Friday evening, May 3, the first of a series of special meetings will be held by the Rochester Central Verein of America and the National Catholic Women's Union.

It was a large and enthusiastic audience that greeted the Fordham Glee Club in its concert for the benefit of Camp Stella Maris, on Monday night.

The chorus of sixty trained voices under the direction of Frederic Joslyn responded generously. Once again the Club demonstrated its ability to sing sacred music when in one group of songs they reverently sang Handel's "In Nomine" and Brumby's "Gloria" by Buzzi-Pecchia was likewise sung with reverence and devotion.

Veracity was manifested in the singing of "This Old Hammer" and "That Tappan at the Door" and Nagler's "Serenade in the Snow."

The rousing "Fordham Ram-farr" Joslyn, by Conway and Breslin's "Fordham Marching Song" were enthusiastically received by the audience as was Joslyn's "O Alma Mater Fordham" sung with feeling.

Robert J. Thomas, 41, tenor soloist followed his program numbers with several encores demanded by the audience, and was heard in an incidental solo in "You're My Heart Alone" by Lehár. Arthur L. Hanrahan, 43, rendered the incidental solo in "Campbell-Tipton's 'A Spirit Flower'."

In numbers by Bach and Levitski, the piano duo of Alexander DeRosa, 43 and Donald J. Reagan, 41, brought to a most popular conclusion the fast tempo "Kitten on the Keys."

Funeral services for Sister M. Heriberta were conducted last Tuesday at Holy Trinity Church, Philadelphia, Pa. She was the former Teresa Bindnagle of St. Peter and Paul's Parish, Rochester, N.Y. One sister, Mary Bindnagle, of 308 Champlain St., Rochester, N.Y.

Sister Heriberta began her training for the Sisterhood at St. Michael's Convent on Clinton Ave. She continued her studies at the Notre Dame Motherhouse at Baltimore where she pronounced her vows.

After teaching for a number of years in New York, where she became a Superior, Sister Heriberta returned to Philadelphia to teach at the Fourteen Holy Martyrs School. At the time of her death, this beloved nun was in her fifty-third year of the Sisterhood. She was stationed at Philadelphia in Holy Trinity parish. Popular with the children, Sister won the admiration and esteem of all whom she taught. In her fifty years in the Sisterhood Sister Heriberta led an exemplary life and was the friend of all her associates. Especially characteristic of her was her strong personal sanctity and outstanding devotion to her vocation.

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Do You Know This Easy Way To Make Welsh "Rabbit" It's easy, better than most canned varieties, what makes this rabbit 1 tablespoon butter, 1/4 cup oil or lard, 1 lb. ground Cheddar or aged American cheese, 1 egg yolk, 1 teaspoon Worcestershire, 1 teaspoon mixed mustard, salt, 1/2 cup milk paprika. Place the butter and oil in shallow dish of double boiler. When hot, put in the ground cheese and melt slowly, stirring steadily. When smooth, add egg yolk mixed with Worcestershire and milk and stir for a few moments until thickened. Serve on the soft side of hot-toast with the crust removed. Garnish with a dash of paprika.
