be one of the more likable young actors. The picture has its exciting sequences but gets fairly melodramatic in spots. Nevertheless, it's moderately entertaining and it's good to see Sidney again.
"The Penalty"—A-2
"The Penalty" is straight from the days of the old melodramas. It's a regeneration piece about a big-time gangster (Dovey fellow), who is teaching his young son all the fine tricks of the trade including the most effective methods of killing. Sonny is separated from his loving father for awhile and sent out on the farm where he is regenerated by the kindly country folk. Gene Reynolds manages to win some slight sympathy for the son but Edward Arnold, Marsha Hunt, Lionel Barrymore, Robert Sterling and Veda Ann Barr are all pretty unhappy with their assignments. For that they can't be blamed.
