Constitution Given Ladies Of Charity Fordham Glee Club Heard At Mass and In Concert

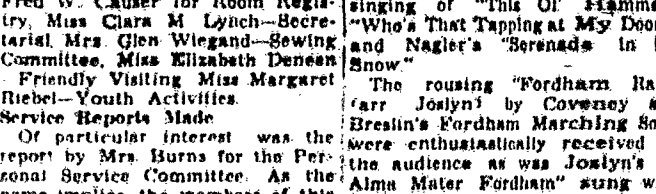

At the regular monthly meeting of the Central Executive Council in the Federation Building on Wednesday, April 24, Mrs. Frances O'Connor, President, advised the members of the Council of the formal approval of the constitution of the Ladies of Charity by the Holy See. The constitution of which the Elmira unit is a branch.
The name and object of the organization is given as follows: This organization shall be called the Ladies of Charity of the Catholic Charities of Elmira, Diocese of Rochester. It is affiliated with the Ladies of Charity of the Association of Catholic Charities of New York City.
The aim of the association is to honor Our Lord Jesus Christ in the persons of His suffering members, to do good to the poor, and to strengthen and enlarge the sphere of usefulness both in philanthropy, social service and civic work.
The duties of the President, Vice President, Executive Secretary, Treasurer and Secretary are listed.
The project of the organization are listed with the stipulation that other committees may be added as the need arises if approved by a plurality vote of the Central Council.
This Constitution is based on document used by the New York office with a few changes made to meet the local situation.
At this meeting of the Central Executive Council reports were given on activities of the following committees by their respective chairmen:
Miss Mary Lennon for Big Sister Council, Mrs. Joseph Spiegel for Campaigning Committee, Miss Florence Bird for Employment and Vocational Committee, Mrs. Joseph M. Daley for Foster and Farm Homes, Mrs. William Burns for Personal Service, Miss Dorothy Martin for Recreation, Mrs. Thomas J. Causer for Room Registry, Miss Clara M. Lynch—Secretary, Mrs. Glen Wiegand—Secretary, Miss Elizabeth Denean for Friendly Visitation, Mrs. Margaret Riebel—Youth Activities, Service Reports Made.
Of particular interest was the report by Mrs. Burns for the Personal Service Committee. As the name implies, the members of this committee are concerned with giving service in a personal way to those with whom they come in contact. Regular visits are made to the County Home, The Chemung Tuberculosis Sanitarium and Gleason Health Resort. When a lonely patient speaks of a relative who is unable to come and see him because of lack of transportation, a committee member contacts this person and makes arrangements for transportation to the County Farm or Sanitarium. The project of this service is not to be measured in terms of statistics and it can have little meaning to anyone who has not known the need of it.
The projects of this committee also include collection of Catholic periodicals for distribution by other committees of the Association.
The project of the collection of clothing and household articles for special cases under care of Catholic Charities and an active participation in the 1941 Community Chest Campaign.
They recently added to their program a special project of a cookbook compiled locally. This will be offered for sale within the next month. Net proceeds will be used for campership fund of the Ladies of Charity, as a means of financing camp periods for children who would otherwise not be able to enjoy the privilege.
Preliminary plans were made for the next general assembly of all members of the Ladies of Charity. This will be held at Hartwood, N. Y. on June 8.
The meeting will be followed by a Silver Tea. Mrs. Joseph M. Spiegel is Chairman of the arrangements for the tea.

This Easy Way To Make Welsh "Rabbit"
It's easy, better than most canned varieties, when made this way:
1 teaspoon butter, 1/2 cup rice or beer, 1 lb. ground Chicken or aged American cheese, 2 egg yolks, 1 teaspoon Worcestershire, 1 teaspoon mixed mustard, salt, 1/2 cup milk, paprika.
Place the butter and rice in chafing dish or double boiler. When hot, put in the grated cheese and melt slowly, stirring steadily. When smooth, add egg yolks mixed with Worcestershire and salt and stir for a few moments well thickened. Serve on the soft side of hot buttered with the crust removed. Garnish with a dash of paprika. Atomic palate—plenty, celery and cooked nuts and oil of butter. Serve it.
