Explain Revision Occurs Only In
Translation--Not In Doctrine

NEW YORK (AP)—To clear up confusion as to the nature of the New Testament revision which is to be released to the public on Bible Day, Sunday, May 18, leaders in the work of revising the New Testament met with the press here. The New Testament revision has been placed in the hands of the Holy Name Society of the nation. At the press conference here May 6 the Very Rev. Charles J. Callan, D.D., a member of the Pontifical Biblical Commission said that great deal of confusion exists about the revision and that many queries have come in.

Solemn Mass To
Be Offered For
Chest Campaign

Local Agencies And United Service
Organizations Join In Campaign

To meet the 1941 challenge to the Rochester Community Chest with its national defense problems, 44 local agencies facing pressing problems at home, the United Service Organizations, a new and vital factor, and the rapidly expanding Red Cross program, Catholics in Rochester are called upon to rally to the Chest's aid.

May 12 to May 19 has been designated as the period for united effort throughout the city to give Rochester's answer to the National Defense Call. That God may bless abundantly all the workers for the Rochester Community Chest, and all those who support it by contribution, His Excellency, the Most Rev. James E. Kearney, D.D., Bishop of Rochester, will preside at a Solemn High Mass in Sacred Heart Cathedral at 11 A. M., Sunday, May 11.

The sermon for the occasion will be delivered by His Excellency, Bishop Kearney. Represented at the Solemn High Mass will be the various Catholic Agencies participating in the Chest, as well as by their clients, wherever possible. All associated with the Rochester Community Chest, either as members or directors, agency representatives or workers, are welcome to attend this service. In all the city churches on Sunday the 1941 Community Chest Letter of Bishop Kearney will be read. (This letter appears on this page.)

Calling the local needs, and the added national appeal to secure sound morale for the men in service, the Bishop states: "This year, of all years, the Chest must not fail. The increase in your donation will be an eloquent expression of your interest in the souls of our soldier-sons."

U. S. O. Work Outlined. The U. S. O. interest in the financial appeal being made for the United Service Organizations of which the National Catholic Community Service is a part, is an integral part. (Information on the U. S. O. is contained in article beginning on page 1.)

The U. S. O., through its war-relief program, is sponsoring more than 200 service clubs in great adjacent to army camps, naval bases and defense industries. The buildings are to be constructed by the U. S. O. It is our part of the national drive to raise \$10,000,000 to carry out this program that the Rochester Community Chest is appealing for. To the Bishop, the Chest is the national drive will begin on June 1 in areas other than Rochester.

Participating in the Rochester Community Chest are nine Catholic agencies. (See tabulation of agencies below.) These agencies are: Rochester Catholic Charities, St. Ann's Home for the Aged, St. Mary's Boys' Home, St. Patrick's Girls' Home, Columbus Youth Association, St. Elizabeth Guild House, Genesee Institute, Charles Settlement House and St. Mary's Hospital.

Chest leaders aware that this is a critical year are sparing all efforts to get increased pledges. "Be a Good Neighbor" is the cry and this covers the souls of neighbors in the service and to the people to whom the Red Cross brings its invaluable aid.

Legal Aid Society Elects

At the annual meeting of the Legal Aid Society held April 29, Joseph P. Macweeney was re-elected President, with Mrs. Arthur Rutherford, Jr., and Vilas M. Swan Vice-Presidents. Other officers elected were Don C. Allan, Treasurer, and Emory A. Brownell, Secretary. The following were elected directors for three-year terms: John P. Bush, Jr., Harry E. Crowley, Mrs. John E. Fitzmaurice, Leonard Jones and Mrs. Rutherford.

Reporting on the year's work, Mr. Brownell, as Executive Attorney, stated that the Society had handled 428 cases during the year, of which 2,801 were new cases. Although this represents a 7% increase in volume over the year previous, other aspects of the report indicate a substantial improvement in economic conditions. Mr. Brownell stated. It was found, for instance, that 3 times as many applicants were able to employ private attorneys than was the case the year before and that 34% of the clients were employed at
