Dr. Boland Scores Lack of 'Living Wage'

Employers who disregard the moral code, particularly with regard to a living wage, were scored in an address here Sunday night by the Rev. John P. Boland, D. D., Buffalo, chairman of the State Labor Relations Board.

Speaking to more than 100 persons at the new St. Joseph's House of Hospitality, conducted by the Catholic Worker group at 401 South Ave. near Mt. Hope Ave., the Buffalo priest asserted:

"Employers, to be just, must respect the dignity of man's nature, must use no fraud or violence, must assign no task beyond the strength of the workman and must give suitable wages."

Dr. Boland's address, delivered in commemoration of the issuance of the encyclical of the two papal encyclicals on capital and labor—the "Humani Generis" of Pope Leo XIII and the "Quadragesimo Anno" of the late Pope Pius XI—was titled "The Road to Industrial Peace."

Pointing out that the encyclical describes the duty of employers as well as employer, Dr. Boland stated:

"Remembering the dignity of labor, workers will faithfully perform the work agreed upon, without shirking or carelessness. They will avoid harming their employer either in his person or in his property. They will do their best to improve their own condition, even when vindictive rights."

A reasonable living wage, Dr. Boland said, must include sufficient income not only for food, clothing and shelter, but also for opportunities for recreation, social intercourse, culture and the faithful performance of the religious duties that have been imposed by God Himself.

"The cry of the laborer for a just wage," the speaker declared, "is a demand for an inalienable right."

More than half the current strikes, Dr. Boland stated, are due to labor's resistance, refusal to discontinue the work when the demand for a more suitable wage, he struck an optimistic note, however, by saying that, in his experience in labor relations work he had noted that the conference table is becoming more in vogue."

Dr. Boland had considerable praise for the "activist" work being carried on at the House of Hospitality, with 150 transient and homeless men are fed free meals daily.

"You are doing a very commendable job here," he commented. "You are answering the call of Pope Leo XIII: 'Go to the worker, go to the poor.' You are giving concrete answer to the call of Pope Pius XI to the laity for Catholic Action."

Dr. Boland was introduced by the Rev. George C. Vogt, director of the Catholic Labor College and spiritual director of the Worker group. The Buffalo priest answered several questions on labor matters following his address.

Activities of the Worker group, which has given out more than 100,000 free meals in nearly two years, as well as numerous articles of clothing, were described by Arthur Farrow. He also outlined the program of the Labor College, which has just closed its second season. In another brief talk George Vogt described the historical background of the papal encyclicals on capital and labor. Thomas Scallan presided and introduced the speakers. Several of the clergy and leaders of organized labor were in the audience.
