

It is characteristic of measles to begin after the manner of an ordinary cold in the head, sometimes with the accompaniment of sore eyes, and after three or four days the breaking out in a rash on the face and body.

This preliminary cold is in fact the cold that disease for it is a part of the disease for it is caused by the virus of measles. With this in mind, parents will not dismiss too lightly a newly con-tracted cold in their child when measles is present in the com-munity, and all children having head colds will be kept home-from school until the ailment resolves itself as not being a serious one. The same precalition prevails in the control of schooping cough. The virus of the disease is present in the nose and throat secre-tions of the afflicted child and is easily communicable as a result. The spasmodic cough or whoop that characterizes this disease is preceded by a common cold lasting from a few days to two weeks. During all this preliminary period the virus of the disease is present in the nose and throat and may e easily spread through indiscrimnate sneezing and coughing.
