St. Ann's (Hornell) THROUG AT COMMUNION

General Communion of Mass of the Parish offered to 200 members—Large Crowd Present in Holy Name

HORNELL.—The 1900 members of St. Ann's Church had an inspiring spectacle on Mother's Day when close to 200 men received Holy Communion in a group which was offered up for their mothers, and also for the dead. The celebrant of the Mass was the Rev. William A. Cannon, who was to address the men later at the Communion Breakfast which was held immediately following the Mass. Toastmaster at the breakfast was Charles Smith, 6th President of the Society when it was formed ten years previous. He was introduced by John Grant, President of the Society at the present time. The Main Speaker, Father Cannon delivered an inspiring address on "Mother's Day," his theme being, "The Mother of God." He urged the men to have such a devotion, especially as he said at this time in the world, when times are so troubled and disturbed. His address bringing in interesting anecdotes made it most enjoyable, and everyone went away with a real message.

Later in the day a delegation of five men attended the Holy Name Convention which was held at Canandaigua.

The breakfast was put on by the Mothers' Club of the parish and proved to be a great success. The election of new officers in the Holy Name Society will take place in the near future. It is planned to keep increasing the number of those receiving Holy Communion every month on the Holy Name Communion Sunday.

The Young Ladies' Society will hold a meeting in a play evening in the Federation Building after which a social evening will be enjoyed. Some future plans of the Sodality will be formulated at this meeting. All are urged to be present.

Every Thursday evening the Rev. Francis Grovney of Buffalo, who is well known as a radio speaker, conducts the radio service in honor of Our Lady of Perpetual Help. His ability as a gifted speaker is evident from the large crowd which attends the services. Two services are held each Thursday throughout the year and many favors have been reported as received through the intercession of Our Mother of Perpetual Help. At the shrine in the church there is an exact replica of the original miraculous picture, exact in every detail, even to the blue and gold. A devotion to the Mother of God is being cultivated into the hearts of the school children who attend the afternoon services each week.

On Sunday morning last Henry M. Lynch of this parish passed away at his residence at 33 Church Street in this city. He has been a trustee of the church since October, 1922. He was retired Allegheny Division Freight Conductor of the Erie Railroad Company. He has been an active member of St. Ann's Parish for the past 40 years. DETROIT WOMEN AID SOUTHERN CAMPS
DETROIT.—How a northern diocese is actively aiding Catholic service men in a southern camp area is demonstrated in the work of the Detroit Archdiocesan Council of Catholic Women on behalf of the National Catholic Community Service.

Inasmuch as the Michigan and Wisconsin selectees are located in camps in the area surrounding Alexandria, La., the Detroit Council of Catholic Women undertook to supply Catholic service men and chaplains in that territory with religious needs.

Miss Anna Rose Klump, Field Secretary of Youth for the National Council of Catholic Women, made a survey in Alexandria for the National Catholic Community Service and reported the needs of chaplains to the Detroit Council. As a result the Council provided chaplains in southern camps with amicae, purificators, song cards, rosaries, prayer books and catechisms.

Co-operating with the Council of Women, students of Marygrove College here have sent 1,000 Army-Navy prayer books to the camps—600 to Louisiana, some to Kentucky, and the rest to individual boys or groups. The students also have contributed toward the purchase of a Mass Kit and are donating altar linens. This summer the girls will aid in the redistribution of literature in the camps.
