And then, in the Eucharist, these great and glorious mysteries are all centered to a point as to speak in the Feast of the Body of the Lord, the Church's solemn commemoration of God's greatest gift to man—the gift of Himself in the Blessed Sacrament of the Altar that... We may all one Bread, one Body be. Through this Holy Sacrament of the Eucharist... Then Jesus comes to a close with the Feast of the Sacred Heart of Jesus with its irrefragable appeal to our faith and love. And in the Feast of His burning Heart 'Would to all His flame impart; Thus He speaks with Love Divine: Give me, Oh give Me that heart Of all things truest great and precious promise are ours, and heaven too'...

Here, then, is our program for June, and for all the troubled days that lie ahead of us that we strive honestly, intelligently and gratefully to win for ourselves and for others the graces of these great days and times set apart by the Church for our instruction and protection by growth in virtue and that 'Peace be accomplished in the knowledge of God, and of Christ Jesus our Lord.' And of this Christ Jesus our work by profession and appointment, to lay hold on virtue, to stir up the grace of God that is in us, to kindle the reason, to kindle the faith, and hope and love, to drive the darkness word about us and 'to do the Truth in Charity'...

Let us pray, then, during this month of June, united in communion and in prayer, for the graces of the gifts of the Holy Spirit and the showing of His fruits in our lives and works, let us pray for a deepened and lively faith in the One True God, let us all receive Our Lord in Holy Communion as often as possible, and make frequent visits in our churches and chapels, and let us all strive to draw closer and closer to Him who said: 'Learn of Me, for I am meek and humble of heart'...

We want peace, not war; love, not hate; mercy, not cruelty; pity, not oppression; justice, not intolerance. And we can have all these things and Heaven too if we will pray for them mightily and deserve them splendidly.
