COURIER'S CURRENT CINEMA COMMENTS

(Editor's Note: Listed by the National Legion of Decency, this week on Class B are the following: "One Night in Lisbon"—Objection: "Suspicious in dialogue and situations"; "The Boy Goodbye"—Objection: "Inappropriate language and song"; "Woman's Face"—Objection: "Suspicious in scenes. But no horror and her wrong-doing."

It depends on whether your preference is for good pleasant pictures or good unusual ones which picture you rate the movie of the week. But there are several good ones: "Million Dollar Baby," "Dream of Butterfly" . . . and, less important, but amusing, "Till We Meet Again."

"Million Dollar Baby" is the kind of movie that is unexpectedly entertaining because you expect so little from it. It hasn't received a big build-up. It attempts to be nothing but a very amusing little comedy. But it's delightful, honest weather entertainment. The story is that of an ancient Greek philosopher who is given one million dollars, but the way it is handled is fresh and clever.

Priscilla Lane is becoming an able light comedienne and she receives excellent support. Veteran May Robson hasn't had such a good role in years and veteran Helen Westley plays a slatternly Brooklyn lady as expertly as she handles her more familiar role of good-hearted show. The picture is an adequate leading man and there's a boy named John Ridgely who shows promise. But it is Ronald Reagan who is a revelation. Just a leading man for a long time, he got an opportunity for some real dramatic acting in "Katie Goes to New York" and scored in "Million Dollar Baby" he shows comedy ability well. He's likable and so is the picture.

"A Woman's Face"—B Joan Crawford, who has long hankered after the meatier things of the drama, gets a strong role in "A Woman's Face" and makes a lot more out of it than you would expect. In the picture, she plays a woman with a horribly disfigured face . . . whose mind is warped because of her deformity. Her face is fixed up and so she marries by Melvyn Douglas as a surgeon.

This is a fascinating theme and both Director George Cukor and screenwriter Donald Ogden Stewart have developed it well. However the picture has its faults. It moves slowly . . . almost deliberately through the first part and doesn't begin to build suspense until it is more than half way through. Also the motivation is frequently shadowy. Changes in character are sudden, abrupt, rather than gradual and certain situations approach the objectionable, particularly the so-called psychological explanation for the woman's wretchedness.

If it is the direction and writing are of a high order, so is the acting of the cast. Conrad Veidt is a suavely sinister, Albert Basserman is a realistically kindly and bewildered old man, Donald Meek and Reginald Denny are good.
