New St. Mary's Hospital To Rise On Site Of Ground-Breaking Rite

Bishop Lauds Record Of Nuns In Charge

Visions of a new and greatly needed St. Mary's Hospital rose before a large crowd gathered at the site on Genesee Street as His Excellency Bishop Kearney turned the earth, May 28, to launch work officially on the approximately \$1,000,000 project.

To provide a large part of the cost, a public subscription campaign is to be conducted in the late summer or early fall.

More than 300 persons, including priests, nuns, nurses, patients and friends of the hospital heard Bishop Kearney dedicate the ceremony to the Blessed Mother, and laud the Sisters of Charity of St. Vincent de Paul for "making the hospital so valuable to our community."

The Bishop's act of ground-breaking was followed in turn by Dr. Leo T. Simpson, chief of St. Mary's staff; Frederick J. Weider, president of the board of directors; and Sister Martina, mother superior and superintendent of the hospital.

Placing a medal in the hole, His Excellency shoveled the earth back into the opening and sprinkled with holy water to conclude the ceremony. The crowd sang the Star Spangled Banner as St. Mary's Boys Home band played.

Newest Features

"Construction of the ultra-modern 375-bed hospital which will combine the best features of institutions throughout the country will be underway soon under the direction of Joseph P. Flynn, architect.

Plans call for a six-story building with 25 four-bed wards, 50 two-bed wards, 60 single and 56 beds for children.

The new hospital will be of novel design, resembling two "Y's" ends and will extend from Congress St. to Ardmore St. facing Genesee. Provided will be extensive parking facilities and a special ramped automobile entrance which will be built to the basement where emergency rooms will be located.

Other facilities in the basement will include the main kitchen, dietetic kitchen, cafeteria, private dining rooms, an auditorium, locker rooms and autopsy room.

5 Floors To Rise

The main floor in addition to a 45-foot by 45-foot lobby, will contain five private rooms, all administration offices, a switchboard room, staff lounge, record room, medical and general library, and the chaplain's suite and oratory.

The two rear wings will be devoted to pediatric work and will have a sun porch extending the width of the building and facing Ardmore Street in addition to an enclosed solarium.

All operating rooms will be on the second floor. The present operating room will be discontinued. The four major and two minor operating rooms will be located in one wing and special operating rooms will be in an adjoining wing.

A large central control and supply room will be on the second floor to which all material will be sent through a dumb waiter and from which sterilized material will be sent to all floors through a second dumb waiter.

The entire third floor will be devoted to maternity cases and will contain three four-bed wards, 12 two-bed semiprivate rooms, and 27

Hitler May Go Down Sooner Than Expected

WASHINGTON — "In the Providence of God the baffling and terrifying power of Adolf Hitler may be broken and destroyed much sooner than now seems probable," the Rt. Rev. Msgr. John A. Ryan, Director of the Social Action Department of the National Catholic Welfare Conference, told members of the graduating class of Trinity College here.

Preaching the baccalaureate sermon, Monsignor Ryan said "the future is not entirely dark" and recalled that fourteen centuries ago Attila "overran and ravaged much of Asia and most of Europe causing vast and greater injury to persons and property in his time than has yet been inflicted by the pseudo-civilized barbarian, Adolf Hitler." But after Attila's death, he added, "there remained not a trace of his depredations and slaughter."

Monsignor Ryan asserted that following the defeat of Hitler the tasks of "binding up the wounds of the millions who have been outraged in their persons their homes, their livelihood and their possessions" will fall "mainly upon the United States." "The obligations of Christian charity, which are binding between nations as well as between individuals," he said, "will no doubt be fully and cheerfully discharged by our people and our government."

Cardinal Named Papal Legate

Card. Dougherty Again Honored

ST. PAUL—His Holiness Pope Pius XII has named His Eminence Cardinal Dougherty, rector of Philadelphia, to be his Legate to the Ninth National Eucharistic Congress, to be held in the Twin Cities, June 23 to 26, it was announced in word received here.

Cardinal Dougherty will be the personal representative of the Holy Father at all Congress functions. His official suite will include the Rt. Rev. Msgr. J. Carroll McCormick, Chancellor of the Archdiocese of Philadelphia; the Rev. Salvatore M. Burgo, O.S.A., of St. Vincent Seminary, Germantown, Pa., who will be Master of Ceremonies; Aloysius Fitzpatrick, of Philadelphia, a Knight of St. Gregory; and a member of the clergy and a member of the laity from the Archdiocese of St. Paul who are yet to be named.

This is the second time Cardinal Dougherty has received the high honor of appointment as Papal Legate. He was the personal representative of Pope Pius IX to the Thirty-third International Eucharistic Congress, held in Manila in 1937.

Fifth U. S. Cardinal

Cardinal Dougherty, the fifth American prelate to be made a Cardinal, has governed Bess on two continents. A brilliant student, even from his earliest years, and a distinguished administrator, Cardinal Dougherty observed the twentieth anniversary of his ordination as Bishop of Erie in the Philippines. He had previously served as Bishop of Nueva Segovia, also in the Philippines. When he observed the silver jubilee of his episcopal consecration, he was Archbishop of his native Archdiocese of Philadelphia. Earlier, he had returned to the United States as Bishop of Buffalo. In all, Cardinal Dougherty has governed four Bess.

The reception accorded Cardinal Dougherty when he returned from Rome in 1937 following his appointment to the Sacred College was one of the most impressive in the history of Philadelphia. Some 600,000 persons massed along the city's streets to greet him. The Mayor of Philadelphia and the Governor of Pennsylvania were among those who eulogized the churchman and his work.

In June 1928, 200,000 men, women and children, representing every parish in the Archdiocese of Philadelphia, participated in a joint celebration of the silver episcopal jubilee of Cardinal Dougherty and the dedication of the new Seminary of St. Charles Borromeo. Pope Pius XI sent Cardinal Dougherty a letter commemorating the occasion and that Papal Secretary of State, His Eminence Pietro Cardinal Gasparri, wrote to recall that he took part in Cardinal Dougherty's episcopal consecration and to extend "the liveliest sentiments of mutual friendship."

Pope Pius XII honored Cardinal Dougherty with a special letter on this occasion. In an epistle which he wrote and signed himself, the Holy Father told Cardinal Dougherty "your merits towards the Church are truly excellent and superabundant, with them, you have shone prominently from the first days of your manhood in the office of teaching, clerical, and above all in the exercise of the Episcopate."

"These merits of yours," Pope Pius XII added, "were well known to Our predecessors, among whom

Vatican City, June 1.—(The Cable) — The official English translation of the Holy Father's radio address, broadcast in Italian, commencing the 25th anniversary of Pope Leo XIII's Encyclical Rerum Novarum.

The Feast of Pentecost, the glorious birthday of the Church of Christ, is to be observed, dear children, in its own right, as a solemn and significant occasion, and as a day of prayer, reflection and thanksgiving. It is a day when the Holy Spirit descended upon the apostles and the Church, and when from that time forth the Holy Spirit has been the guiding and animating principle of the Church's life and mission.

But the spirit of the Vatican Council of 1869-70, which was the first ecumenical council since the Council of Trent, and which was the first council to be held in the modern world, is still a living and active force in the life of the Church.
