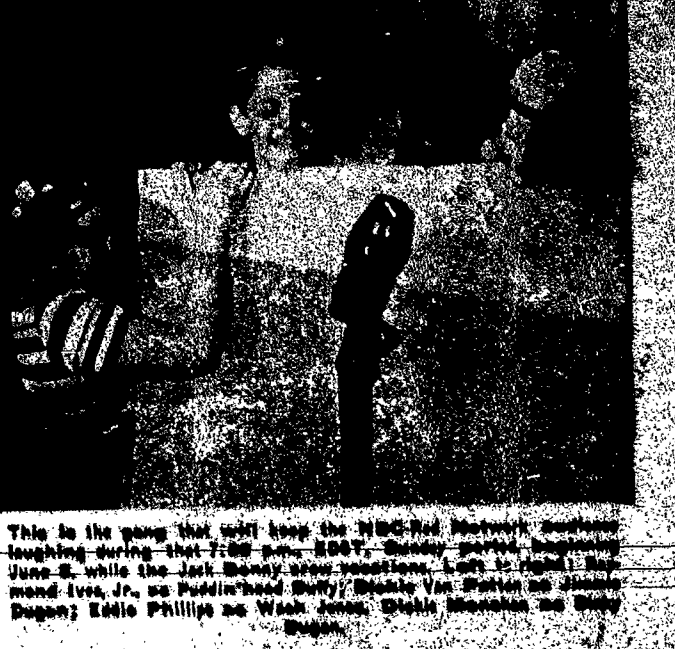
### Alhambra Ladies Honor Officers

We quote from a letter received from Rev. Luelien Laumann, Director of the National Catholic School of Social Service in Washington:

"I acknowledge with gratitude receipt of \$25.00 from the Rochester Diocesan Council of Catholic Women a contribution to the Maintenance Fund of the National Catholic School of Social Service."

"Two fundamental needs are foremost in our minds as we are called upon, even with sacrifices, to support far-reaching projects necessary for the maintenance of our Church and country."

One is the service we are going to render to the boys who leave their homes and parishes and who will need protection in a strange life in a new locality.

"Another is the need for trained persons with sound Catholic philosophy who will be prepared to assist them in the emergency development of the social conditions of reconstruction."

"Through the years the Catholic women of America have preserved their School of Social Service for needs such as those we face at present. The Catholic women have already pledged their School to the maintenance of this present emergency, and the continuation of their efforts to develop a corps of Catholic leaders to press to the future."

The present and future will find your Council and School prepared.

"May God guide and bless us all in our efforts to preserve a true Christian democracy."

Commencement Exercises will take place at the School on Sunday, June 9.

The Ninth National Eucharistic Congress will be held in the cities of St. Paul and Minneapolis, June 22-28, 1941, under the sponsorship of His Excellency the Most Rev. John Gregory Murray, Archbishop of St. Paul.

At the kind invitation of Archbishop Murray the National Council of Catholic Women was invited to prepare the program for the women's section meeting to be held June 25 from 2 to 5 P. M. at the National Eucharistic Congress.

The general theme for the Congress is "Christ glorified through sacrifice" and is based upon the Encyclical by Pope Pius XI on "The Reparation Due to the Sacred Heart." The theme of our particular activity will be "Christ glorified in the service of Church and State." His Excellency Archbishop Mooney of Detroit will preside. Monsignor Michael J. Ready, General Secretary of the National Catholic Welfare Conference, will be the keynote speaker, and our former Episcopal Chairman, Archbishop of New Orleans, will lead the discussion. The program will include a symposium by outstanding Catholic women.

Rev. Leo J. Mooney has been named Rochester Diocesan Director for the Pilgrimage to the Convention.

The Rochester Diocesan Council has been invited to assist at the public meetings of the 12th National Convention of the Catholic Students' Mission Crusade to be held in Rochester June 27-30.

The Rochester Diocesan Mission Crusade is an organization of American Catholic Youth consecrated to the Christianization of the World by prayer, study and sacrifice.

At the Directors' Meeting of the Rochester Diocesan Council, NCCW, will be held in Rochester on June 27. This will give our out-of-town members an opportunity to also attend the Convention.

The 5th Annual Institute on Industry will be held at the National Catholic School of Social Service, June 16-21, 1941.

The Institute is arranged primarily for women workers, but others may be admitted who are interested in the program offered. The fee of \$25.00 covers the cost of room, board and tuition.

Admitted organizations or individuals will be well repaid in the far-reaching effects of instruction well timed and ably given.

Mrs. M. H. Keogh, National Director of the NCCW, from the Province of New York is leaving for Washington to attend the meeting of the Board of Directors to be held at Headquarters June 8 and 10.

Mrs. Keogh is also planning to attend the Commencement Exercises of the National Catholic School of Social Service and also the Catholic University with which the School is affiliated.
