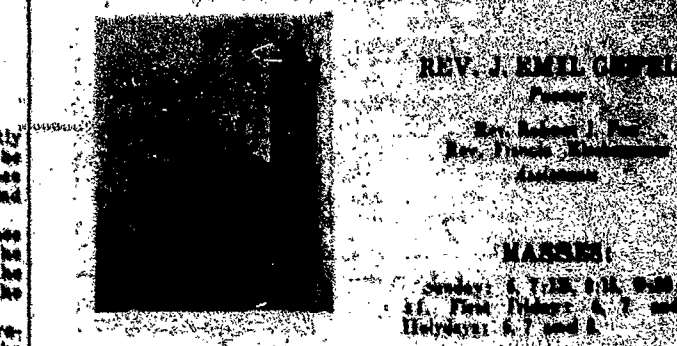

Two more errant husbands go the rag route this week to win back their wives. But, although Dennis Morgan is not prettier than William Powell, the winning William's woman is lots more fun. It happens in "Love Crazy."

"Love Crazy"—A-2
Powell and Myrna Loy could make "Othello" a side-splitting comedy if they decided they wanted to play it that way. So when they got something that's really funny to start with, you can't hold them down. That's the way it is with "Love Crazy" and it's one of the most consistently hilarious comedies of the season. That basic theme about the winning back of wife is old stuff but it's just a framework upon which to pile some of the most wildly funny gags you have seen—one on top of another until you think that you can't possibly laugh any more. But there's that! In the winning William's woman is lots more fun. It happens in "Love Crazy."

"Affectionately Yours"—A-2
Another wandering husband tries to win back his wife by means of the most ancient gag that could be culled from Joe Miller's Joke Book and Mack Sennett's film comedies. This time it's Dennis Morgan and he tries awfully hard to be bright and whimsical, but while Dennis is a very handsome—(as if he didn't know)—leading man, he just mistakes out when he tries to be Madcap Morgan, comedian. Of course, he doesn't get much help from his material.

The difference between this piece and "Love Crazy" which has the same basic theme is the difference between polished comedy, competently played and perfectly timed, and slapstick done by a cast that seems grimly determined to get the whole dreadful thing over as quickly as possible.

Here Oberon can, on occasion, be as sparkling a comedienne as she is in dramatic roles. But the poor thing doesn't have much of a chance to sparkle with wit falling into lines and being pursued by Morgan and Ralph Bellamy. She goes through the picture as if she were just waiting to dodge a curtain pie. The curtain pie, sure!
