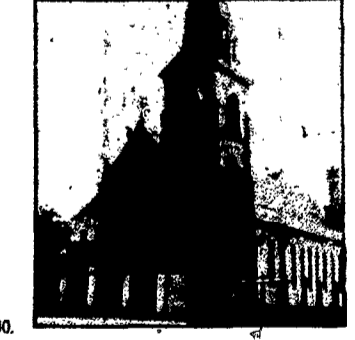

1941 'Year Books'

THE ARETE Graduates and undergraduates at Aquinas Institute Catholic High School for boys and girls in the Basilius Fathers, have in the 1941 Arete, Senior year book a comprehensive record pictorially of their past year in school.

A beautifully sincere tribute to the late Archbishop Thomas F. Hickey, founder of the school furnishes the dedication. Full page photographs of His Excellency the Most Rev. James E. Keane, "shepherd of the flock," the Rev. John H. O'Loane, C.S.B., principal and the Rev. William P. McGee, C.S.B. director of studies are followed by photographs of the faculty which is completely listed.

Individual treatment is given the graduates and action pictures of the various activities, missions, music, drama, clubs and sports are interspersed by well-written articles.

A new feature is introduced in pictures of the graduates as babies, one of which was of interest particularly to the writer, as the first baby now becomes the first graduate of the family from high school.

The "new era" in dramatics is recorded with photographs of "The Four Seasons" and "The School Plays." The famous Aquinas musical organizations, bands and orchestras are presented and the football squad appears in the pictures with individual treatment for the variety.

The humor department original to growing boys and the advertising sections round out a well-organized and carefully planned farewell to the class of 1941.

MERCEDES

Graduates of Our Lady of Mercy High School, conducted by the Sisters of Mercy, are featured in the June edition of Mercedes, semi-annual publication of the school which maintains the high standard of this prize-winning magazine.

Individual photographs of the class of 1941 members form the center of the 76-page edition. Mary Curran as editor-in-chief heads the large editorial and business staff.

"A Tribute to Mercy" by Mary Mallory furnishes the dedication. Alert to the trend of the times, the lead editorial is "Personal Defense First" and states in part: "If strong national defenses are to be reached through personal defense, moral standards must be raised to a higher level. Religion must be re-emphasized to the curriculum of all schools public or private."

"Shining Victory"—A-2 Although it has elements of experimental drama and though it is noted with Irish, Shining Victory is defeated by poor adaptation which merely stretches characters and situations, and by dialogue which is so plodding as a plowhorse. Although James Stephenson and Geraldine Fitzgerald are highly talented actors, they can do little to make "Shining Victory" more than a dull, slow picture. Particularly poor is the character played by Barbara O'Neill. The fault lies with the writer rather than the actress. The character being poorly motivated. She is hastily sketched early in the picture and then forgotten until she is brought suddenly back to provide the picture's climax. There is no real story in the episode. Although A. J. Cronin, author of "The Citadel" wrote this potentially interesting story, "Shining Victory" is just another example of something that might have been.

QUERIES and REPLIES

Q. Are public prayers permitted during the Elevation of the Hosts? A. Any public prayers, that prayers said aloud, are forbidden during the Elevation. Q. Is a penitent who knows full well that he will commit some mortal sin again guilty of sacrilege in going to confession? A. If the person has no intention of making a real effort to avoid sin or the occasion of sin, he is not repentant, and cannot be said to make a good confession.

Q. If, however, he seriously intends to avoid sin as far as possible, then his confession is genuine and the absolution is valid.

Q. How can we think that the Lord, for her? Summe it to say 'We love her and wish her happiness who guides our every day. Yet would we enshrine by dedication some small share of her gift to us—some
