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Oratory Finals At Eastman

Climaxing weeks of local oratorical scrambling in 20 dioceses of the United States, five national finalists will mount the platform to take-part in their last competition on Sunday evening, June 23, in the Eastman Theater.

The elimination contest for the selection of these speakers will be held in the morning and afternoon of Friday, June 21.

Judges for the finals will be authorized by the C. S. M. C. headquarters in Cincinnati.

Winner Gets \$100
The winner in each Conference at the semi-finals here will receive the Paladin Leader degree, while the five finalists will receive the Paladin's Grand Cross and cash awards, the first winner receiving a grand prize of \$100.

Representing the Diocese of Rochester will be Frances Hayes, Nazareth Academy Junior, while Cincinnati will send Mary Burns, Jeannetta Lewis of the Catholic Colored High School will represent the Louisville, Ky. chapter.

Also present will be Elizabeth Kelly from Renaissance, N. Y., Mary Louise Finn of St. Catherine, Ky., Philomena C. de Baca of Denver, Co., A. Jerry Steves from San Antonio, Texas, Anthony O'Friel of Altoona, Pa., Owen J. Cleary of Pittsburgh and Erin Garraway from Memphis, Tenn.

Cities Represented

Other representatives will come from such distant dioceses as St. Louis, La Crosse, Owensboro, New Orleans, Nashville, Milwaukee, Boston, Miami, and Dubuque.

The primary purpose of the oratorical combats having been the fostering of student interest in the Mission Crusade, the Very Rev. Msgr. Edward A. Frecking, national secretary of the C. S. M. C., sums up the aims of the organization by saying, "We are determined to give Catholic youth an opportunity to make itself heard. We want the world to know that our boys and girls have sound opinions and know how to express them."

World's Mission Outposts In Civic Center Exhibits



The Columbus Auditorium will become "The World Within Four Walls" during the 12th National Convention of the Catholic Students Mission Crusade when the leading missionary societies of the country will fill 54 exhibit booths.

The booths will be open daily from 9:30 A. M. to 10:30 P. M. from Wednesday, June 25 to Monday, June 30. The public, Catholic and non-Catholic alike are cordially invited to view these exhibits.

Under the local supervision of Rev. Hugh Hanley, C.S.B., of Aquinas Institute, committees of students from Aquinas, Nazareth Academy, Mercy High School, Academy of the Sacred Heart, St. Joseph's and St. Mary's Commercial Schools, are helping to set up the booths and will act as guides during the exhibition.

Missionary priests and sisters will be at each booth to explain the

exhibits and to describe their work.

Many societies will show movies and have large maps and dioramas to illustrate their activities. Curios from foreign countries, samples of native handicraft, models and posters, will be used to make a vivid picture of the missionary world.

Delegates and guests will be able to converse with such interesting missionaries as the Rev. John E. Conill, S.V.D., a member of the faculty of Catholic University of Peking, the Rev. John S. O'Connor, S.J., from the Jesuit mission in Patna, India and the Rev. Angelus Kelly, Franciscan Father from Sinal, China. The effect upon the missions from the war in Europe and the Far East, will be thoroughly discussed.

In Tribal Regalia

Native Indian boys in bright tribal regalia will come from Mission school in West with the Rev. Bernard A. Cullen, director of the Marquette League, noted for its work among the American Indians. The Negro Missions of the South will be represented by the Josephite Fathers while the results will tell the story of the conversion of the Eskimos of Alaska.

Exhibits of the Catholic Medical Missionaries will show that caring for the sick is an important phase of the missionary's work and often an opening wedge to many conversions.

The Holy Cross Foreign Mission Society is preparing to spotlight its missions in India and the Maryknoll Fathers will show the great strides they have made in China. Of particular interest to grammar school children will be the display of the Holy Childhood Association.

During each exhibition day mission lectures and movies will be held continuously in the Ballroom of the Columbus Civic Center.

Calling All Crusaders!—Typifying the spirit of the 12th National Convention of the Catholic Students Mission Crusade is Frank Black Hawk, of St. Stephen's Mission School in the hills of Wyoming. Frank will be with the Marquette League exhibit, one of the highlights of the 54 mission exhibits opening Wednesday in the Columbus Civic Center Auditorium. Religious orders will bring missionaries from far corners of the globe to lecture and show movies of their labors in the far-flung outposts of Catholicism.

City Host To 1,200 Crusaders

From the four corners of the nation, 1,200 young men and women will come to Rochester and Friday, June 27, for the 12th National Convention of the Catholic Students' Mission Crusade.

For four days these crusaders representing more than 500,000 students in Catholic colleges, high schools and seminaries of the country, will attend forums and exhibits, business sessions and large public meetings.

Here the students from many states in the union will meet missionary workers from foreign lands. In open forums they will have a chance to ask questions and compare ideas, to hear suggestions and criticisms for bettering their mission work.

They will see vivid examples of mission activity in 54 exhibit booths to be erected by missionary societies in the Auditorium of the Columbus Civic Center.

Evening Scheduled

Inspiration will be furnished by eloquent speakers, by a colorful Pontifical Mass at the Red Wing Stadium and by mass meetings in the Eastman Theater.

For nearly a year, Rev. John S. Randall, Diocesan Director of the C. S. M. C. and 300 local students have planned the convention.

The student-delegates will be welcomed by the Rochester C. S. M. C. Conference at an informal tea dance at the Sagamore Roof Garden on Friday afternoon.

On Friday evening at 8:30 in the Eastman Theater the first general session of the Convention will open with a welcome by Bishop James E. Kearney, the episcopal host for the Crusade. Several addresses by C. S. M. C. officials will strike the convention keynote.

At 10 A. M. Saturday, June 28, Bishop Kearney will celebrate Pontifical Mass at the Red Wing Stadium before a crowd of 15,000. The sermon will be preached by Archbishop Edward Mooney of Detroit and the music of the Mass will be handled by a choir of 4,000 voices.

Crusaders Banquet

Saturday afternoon, in Convention Hall, there will be two forums on Latin-America and Negro-America. In the evening, at the Chamber of Commerce the Crusaders will be guests at a banquet and dance.

Sunday afternoon a large Foreign Mission Forum featuring mission workers from a dozen foreign lands will attract the Crusaders eager for first-hand accounts of mission work and will give them a chance to discuss problems of mission support and vocations. The finals of the nation-wide Oratorical Contest will be held on Sunday evening at the Eastman Theater.

Monday, June 30, there will be general meetings, elections of national officers, and the framing of Convention resolutions.
