

Stadium Mass To Draw 15,000

For the first time in its history, Rochester's Red Wing Stadium will be the scene of a Pontifical High Mass, Saturday, June 23 at 10 A. M.

The Mass, to be celebrated by the Most Rev. James E. Kearney, Bishop of Rochester, will be attended by the delegates of the C. S. M. C. meeting in convention in this city.

Preceding the Mass a colorful procession of Bishops, Monsignori, clergy and delegates will file into the Park.

Hierarchy To Attend
A score of Bishops, dressed in episcopal splendor, are expected to participate in this procession, together with several hundred clergy, many of whom will be missionaries wearing garb of their foreign fields of labor.

The usual units of the Mission Crusade, arrayed in the rich and varied colors of their caps and gowns will precede the costume of religious and dignitaries flanking the altar erected on the diamond.

Most Rev. Francis J. Spellman, Archbishop of New York, and Metropolitan of the Province, will preside at the throne during the Mass.

Most Rev. Edward Mooney, Archbishop of Detroit, will deliver an address to the delegates. Arch Bishop Mooney, formerly Bishop of Rochester, has had wide experience in the Mission field. Prior to his appointment to Rochester he served some time as Apostolic Delegate to India and Japan.

Ways Choir To Sing
A choir of 6,000 voices of local high school and parochial school students, under the direction of the Rev. Benedict Ehmman, professor of Sacred Music at St. Bernard's Seminary, will sing the Mass.

A special choir of Seminarians will chant the proper of the Mass, with Offertory music supplied by a schola composed of students from Nazareth College, Nazareth Academy, Academy of the Sacred Heart and Mercy High School.

Parents Will Assist
This choral group, the largest that will perform in North America this year, will be accompanied at the organ by Gerard Vogt, organist at Corpus Christi Church.

Under the direction of the Rev. Lawrence E. Casey and the Rev. Thomas Brennan, students from St. Bernard's Seminary will act as officers of the Mass, with ushering provided by students of Niagara U. and Aquinas Institute directed by the Rev. Alphonsus Crimmins. Rev. James McAniff has supervision of the procession which will precede the Mass.

Transportation for the delegates from their downtown hotels to Red Wing Stadium has been arranged by the Rev. Leonard Kelly of Nazareth College.

The service will be broadcast on a national hookup by Station WHAM from 10:30 A. M. to 11 A. M.

Zamzam Sinking Puts Basutoland In News

MONTREAL.—The South African Vicariate of Basutoland recently was much in the news, owing to 17 Canadian missionaries having been interned by the Germans after the sinking of the Egyptian liner Zamzam on which the Canadians were bound for Basutoland.

This vicariate is directed by the Most Rev. Joseph Bonhomme, O.M.I., a Canadian and practically all his missionaries are Canadians. The latest figures for 1940, just issued here, show the extent of the work carried out last year: Baptisms, 151,755; Communion, 1,149,750; schools, 335; students, 29,872; nuns, European, 138; native nuns, 164; Oblate priests, 93; diocesan priests, one; Brothers, 22; native Brothers, six; grand seminarians, 19; minor seminarians, 50; students in classical colleges, 306.

Marist Brothers Teach 9,000 Chinese

ROME.—The Echo, of Chefoo-Chian, reports that the Marist Brothers have nearly 9,000 pupils in their schools in China.

In each school some pupils had to be turned away for lack of room. The school at Tsingtao, which had been closed for a year, reopened its doors to 395 pupils, about 100 more than it had accommodated previously.

College Centenary
Halifax, N. S.—This year marks the 100th anniversary of the formal incorporation of St. Mary's College here. The Jesuits conduct the college, which previously had been under direction of the Christian Brothers and later the diocesan clergy.

A native of Lafontaine, Ont., Father DesRoches, who was 40, had been in charge of a mission on the island for five years.

Central Youth Board Formed In East Indies

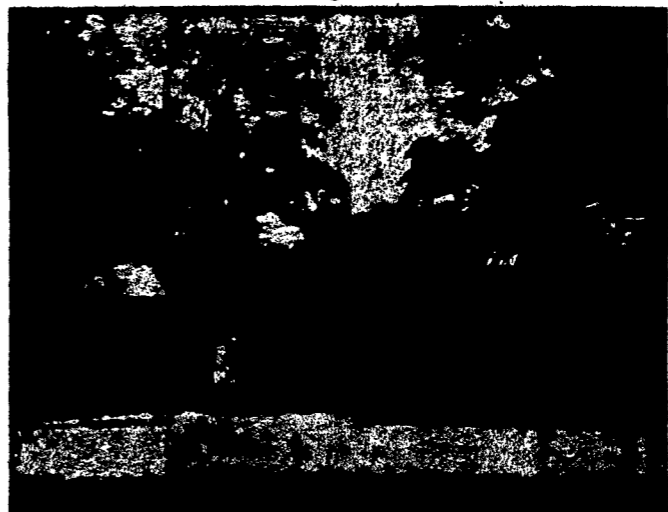
