**Dignitaries of Two Nations Attend Congress in Mexico**

**SANTA FE (N.M.)**—It was a magnificent demonstration of faith and religious liberty that has been restored to the Church in Mexico, though not as yet as full as the Most Rev. Archbishop of Mexico, Cardinal Cerezo, returned from participation in the International Congress recently held at Chihuahua, Mexico, marking the centennial anniversary of the creation of the diocese.

Although officially diocesan, the Eucharistic Congress was really a national demonstration attended by members of the Mexican Hierarchy and many of the clergy from various parts of the country, the Archbishop said.

For the first time since the persecution of the Church began in Mexico, the Bishop went to the Congress in person for the first time since the Revolution.

In addition to Archbishop Cerezo, the Most Rev. Antonio J. Riboldi, S.J., Bishop of El Paso, and the Most Rev. Sidney M. Metzger, Auxiliary Bishop of Santa Fe, participated in the Congress.

"Because there was still some Communist opposition to permitting me in the way of demonstrations than the law allowed," Archbishop Cerezo reported, "the outside presence was a matter of course with the Bishop. He went to the Cathedral in person before the solemn services every day. This had not been witnessed since the Revolution and the result was that when the procession entered into the large Cathedral, which was filled, applause came from the faithful and lasted until all the Bishops were in the Sanctuary.

"When the Holy Father's message was read, kneeling prayer, prayer and blessing upon the Congress the Cathedral echoed with shouting: 'Viva el Papa.'

"All the services were carried over the radio and the result was that the entire city of Chihuahua was in festive attire and the atmosphere of fiesta was present everywhere. National meetings were held in an immense city park stadium, and it was estimated that about 25,000 persons were present every night up to a very late hour. All the sermons and lectures were carried over the radio and heard by thousands of people in the city and other churches of the city, but around about as well.

**Check of Seminarians**

"The choir in the Cathedral was composed of seminarians from Montezuma who had completed their studies and were on their way home—many already ordained priests and others to be ordained at home. The class that finished this year at Montezuma consisted of 76 students, many of whom had labored previously at Montezuma were present at the Congress.

Among the members of the Mexican Hierarchy present were: the Most Rev. Antonio Cerezo, Archbishop of Chihuahua; the Most Rev. Jose M. Gonzalez y Valencio, Archbishop of Durango; the Most Rev. J. Ignacio Marquez, Coadjutor Archbishop of Puebla; the Most Rev. Jose Gerardo Riquelme, Archbishop of Guadalajara; the Most Rev. Luis M. Altamirano, Coadjutor Archbishop of Morelia, and the Very Rev. Felipe Torres, M. S., Apostolic Administrator of the Vicariate Apostolic of Lower California.

**MEXICO RITES BIGOTRY DECRIED**

**Dailies Flay Clergyman's Attacks On Catholics**

**OTTAWA**—Secular newspapers in the Provinces of Ontario, Manitoba and Saskatchewan have published editorials denouncing attacks made upon the Catholic Church in Canada by a Baptist clergyman, Rev. T. T. Shields of Toronto. The clergyman recently was quoted as having declared before the Grand Orange Lodge of Ontario West meeting at St. Thomas, Ont., that the Pope has a "fifth column" in every country in the world.

Commenting on the clergyman's address, the Windsor Daily Star said editorially:

"No matter how varied may be the views as to what this country should do in wartime, there is one point on which everyone is agreed. We cannot make our maximum contribution without national unity. It follows that anyone who deliberately contributes to disunity is an enemy of our war effort. In the light of this, what about the kind of speeches that are being made at the Orange Lodge of Ontario West? His most blatant one to date was the one delivered to the Grand Orange Lodge of Toronto at St. Thomas. Making such remarks at the Orange Lodge of Ontario West is a fifth column in every government in the world is deliberately calculated to arouse strife that cannot but interfere with our united action."

"Dr. Shields is reported to have made various asides to reporters at the meeting, suggesting that his remarks be called to the attention of the censor. That would be a very good idea."

The Winnipeg Free Press, one of the most widely-quoted of Canada's secular papers, said:

"It would be a salutary piece of business if the Dominion Government were to bring up in court the Rev. T. T. Shields of Toronto, charged with an offense under the defense of Canada Regulations. This would give his notorious trouble-maker and Quebec hater a chance to prove his ridiculous charges or go to jail."

"Shields' latest outbreak is to make the statement, according to the Canadian Press, that Canada should have 600,000 men overseas to support the armies in the Middle East and that, this was not an economic matter, but a matter of national unity, they prejudice resulting."

"At a time when the Government is pursuing and jailing fairly obnoxious and harmless people for making loose remarks in beer parlors, it would do a good deal for morale if they tackled Shields and made him eat the words for which he has no proof."

The Leader-Post, daily secular newspaper of Regina, Sask., said:

"There is no justification at any time for the type of bigotry which for many years has characterized the attitude of Rev. T. T. Shields of Toronto, toward the Province of Quebec."

**Anglicans Loan Hall As Fire Destroys Catholic Church**

**ROTHERAY, N. B.**—When fire destroyed the almost century old Church of the Mother of Perpetual Help here, the Rev. Dr. W. R. Hubbard, rector of St. Paul's Anglican Church, offered the use of St. Paul's Sunday school hall, as the temporary church. The offer was gratefully accepted, and the hall, now in use by the Catholic congregation pending rebuilding of the burned structure.

**ORPHANS MARCH TO SAFETY AS FIRE DESTROYS HOME**

**HUBERDEAU, Que.**—The careful manner in which they had been given fire drill, twice a week, undoubtedly saved the lives of 325 boys, all between the ages of six and fourteen years, when fire destroyed the Orphanage of Our Lady of Mercy here in the early morning hours.

Also housed at the orphanage were 30 Misericordia Brothers, who were being directed the institution for 17 years. All except one escaped without injury.

The night watchman saw flames in the recreation building at 3 A. M. and gave the alarm.

The boys quickly donned their clothes, formed ranks and with hands linked made their way to safety. Twice a week the young orphans had been drilled for just such an emergency.

The only one to suffer any injury was Brother Leon, who was the victim of his own heroism. He entered the burning building to make sure all had been saved, and suffered painful burns to his hands and face.

**MICHELANGELO'S PORTRAIT SEEN IN RAPHAEL PAINTING**

**VATICAN CITY**—A portrait of Michelangelo has been discovered in Raphael's famous painting, "The School of Athens."

The discovery was made by Dr. Desobry de Campos, an attaché at the Brazilian Embassy to the Holy See, and announced at a meeting of the Pontifical Academy of Archaeology.

The figure of Michelangelo is identified in the person of "Penseroso" (thoughtful), seated to the left in the picture. Dr. de Campos bases his arguments on the lines of the face and the general design which is clearly different from the Raphael-like figures of the Umbrian school. Dr. de Campos points out that these lines reveal instead the influence of the Michelangelo paintings on the vault of the Sixtine Chapel.

**HOLY FATHER APPOINTS BEARERS OF GOLDEN ROSE**

**VATICAN CITY**—An office abolished under the pontificate of Pope Leo XIII, has been reestablished by His Holiness Pope Pius XII, with the appointment of Prince Enrico Barbattani and Prince Luigi Massimo Lancellotti as Bearers of the Golden Rose.

The Bearer of the Golden Rose is one entrusted with the delivery of the gold ornament which the Pope blesses on the fourth Sunday of Lent, known as Letare, or Rose, Sunday. This ornament, conferred in token of special service or loyalty to the Holy See, has been bestowed on churches, cities, sovereigns and other distinguished persons, but of recent years has been reserved to Catholics alone.

**Serve Countrymen**

Vatican City Reports are received here of the work being done by Italian priests who have been assigned to care for the religious needs of Italian civilians engaged in industrial and agricultural work in Germany. Twenty-four chaplains have charge of the work now.

**PRIEST-SCIENTISTS SEARCH FOR ANCIENT MAN**

**PHILIPPINE ISLANDS**—Two Jesuit anthropologists have penetrated into the Philippine Islands, which had never been visited by the Thureys, searching for the remains of an ancient man. An American priest, Rev. J. Franklin Bowling, S. J., of New York, is assisting in his researches by the Rev. Jaime Nori, S. J., a native of Madaga. Father Bowling is pictured saying Mass for the members of the parish. (S.C.N.C.)

**Release 'Frozen' China Missioner Funds**

**WASHINGTON**—While sorely tried Belgian Missionaries laboring in China pleaded for assistance in their dire want, the Catholic Foreign Mission Society of America, at New York, N. Y., and the National Catholic Welfare Conference, here, collaborated to obtain the release of funds to the credit of the Missionaries, "frozen" by the United States Government in the New York branch of the national bank of Belgium.

As the result of the sale of securities, the Scheut Fathers of Belgium had certain funds on deposit in the Banque Belge Pour l'Etanger in New York, an American branch of the Belgian National Bank. With all aid to the missions from Belgium cut off by the war, the Scheut Fathers in China sought release of their funds in New York, that they might go toward the support of hundreds of missionaries in war-torn China. The Belgian bank in New York applied to the Treasury Department for a license to release the "frozen" funds, and when it encountered difficulties, the missionaries in China appealed to the Maryknoll Fathers in New York for their assistance.

The Maryknoll Fathers enlisted the aid of the N. C. W. C. With the advice and guidance of the N. C. W. C. Legal Department, the Maryknoll Fathers prepared the necessary affidavits, and with representation by the N. C. W. C. Legal Department before Treasury officials, release of the "frozen" mission funds was obtained. The Belgian bank, through its Shanghai office, is turning the money over to the Procurator of the Scheut Fathers in China.

**Named Archbishop**

**Vatican City**—The Most Rev. Anibal Maria Forti, Titular Bishop of Linnus and Auxiliary Bishop of Assunção, Paraguay, has been named Titular Archbishop of Cyrenus and Coadjutor with the Right of Succession to the Archbishop of Assunção.

**CANADIAN OBLATES ON ZANZIBAR TAKEN TO REICH**

**MONTREAL**—The twelve Canadian Oblate missionaries who were among the passengers saved after the Zanzibar ship sank by a German raider in the southern Atlantic have been taken to Germany. It is announced by the Very Rev. Gilles Marchand, Provincial of the Oblates here.

The Superior General of the Oblates, Rev. At. Marcelles, sent a telegram to Father Marchand telling him that he had seen an Oblete on the ship and that the Oblete was in good health.

The ship was captured near the East African coast in the Indian Ocean. The Oblete was taken to the Reich.
