William A. Lang Heads City Defense Program

William A. Lang, secretary to Public Safety Commissioner Thomas C. Woods for the last three years and a half and a former associate editor of the CATHOLIC COURIER, was this week named coordinator of the city's defense activities by the executive committee of the Rochester Defense Council.

The first big task facing the Rochester Defense Council and its newly appointed coordinator is the collection of scrap aluminum for defense production.

Lang lives at 87 Paige St. His salary of \$3,600 a year will be met by a City Council appropriation.

Present plans call for him to direct all defense activities in which the city has a part. These include the activities directly carried out by municipal facilities such as the Fire College, training of auxiliary police and the like, as well as work carried on by various sub-committees of the Defense Council, collection of aluminum, defense housing, industrial, transportation and communication matters, civilian defense, the setting up of defense wardens as urged by Mayor LaGuardia, national civic defense coordinator.

HETZLER TO SPEAK AT INDIAN CHAPEL SITE

Herman G. Hetzler, widely known for his interest in early Christian missionaries and discoveries of evidence of their work among the Indians, will be the principal speaker at a ceremony, Sunday, July 6, at LeVine's, N. Y., near the site of St. Michael's Indian Chapel at Great Gully.

"The Lives of Chaumonot, LeMoine, Raffet, Rene Menard and De Carheil Among the Cayugas" will be Mr. Hetzler's topic. The ceremony marking the 10th anniversary of the opening of the Museum in the restored Indian village will begin at 2:30 P. M.

The village was discovered and opened by Harrison Follett, one of the best known archeologists in the state. Prominent in the setting is a bear effigy in stone, 28 feet long and 9 feet wide.

Large delegations from Syracuse, Auburn and surrounding territory will attend the affair which is open to the public.

Chaplains Ask More Welfare Work In Penal Institutions

WASHINGTON - Two scores Catholic chaplains from leading penal institutions throughout the United States, meeting here this week at the National Catholic School of Social Service in the second annual Institute for Catholic Prison Chaplains, voiced an urgent appeal for more support from the Federal Bureau of Prisons to promote the welfare of those committed to penal institutions, both while these men and women remain in prison and after they return to their respective communities.

The Rev. Francis J. Lane, Catholic Chaplain at Elmira Reformatory, took an active part.

Nine recommendations concerning the work of the chaplains and the relation of their work with the families of prisoners and with the community at large were drawn up at the concluding session of the Institute, held under the auspices of the Federal Bureau of Prisons and the National Conference of Catholic Charities in cooperation with the National Catholic Welfare Conference. The Most Rev. Charles Hubert LeBlond, Bishop of St. Joseph, the Most Rev. Earl J. Altier, Bishop of Toledo, and the Most Rev. Francis P. Keough, Bishop of Providence, acted as a sponsoring committee.

Bishop LeBlond speaks "Through this Institute," Bishop LeBlond said, "the opportunity is being furnished of presenting to the Bishops of the country not only the problems but the constructive programs developed in the work of the chaplains.

"Outside the realm of the Church, the Institute helps in the interpretation of the functions of the chaplain to the officials charged with the administration of penal institutions. The interest of the Federal Government in the work of the chaplains has been from our standpoint one of the most significant recent developments in the whole field of penology. That interest is bound to increase as the officials of state and local communities: it is bound to bring about a recognition of the place of religion in all work of a correctional and remedial nature. And that work religion must occupy an important place if a moral conversion is to be effected. In too many instances religious practice has been looked upon as a badge of weakness rather than a mark of strength. This has been true not only of the men and women themselves but also of many of the personnel who administer the prisons. There is a long struggle ahead before that condition shall be corrected entirely before religion shall take its proper place in institutional programs.
